The angel of death has again visited Jennings and taken away the beloved lady mentioned above. In the midst of life we are death. That sentence was truly shown, when He who ruleth called hence the subject of this sketch. Who among us for a moment thought that she would be called so suddenly away to meet her maker? What a shock it was to her vast legion of friends when they learned that on Monday night last at ten o'clock her earthly career was ended. Truly speaking, it caused a deep feeling of regret in this community where she was so well and favorably known. Her death brings forcibly to mind the immortality of the soul. A vacant chair is left in the family circle—mother, the idol of the home, and the spirit of a true, concise and devoted mother is numbered with the heavenly hosts.

Her life speaks her own eulogy. Her noble acts of kindness; her love for those afflicted with sickness, and her kindly disposition to lend a helping hand in allaying the hand of affliction among her friends, was always visible. There is one grand consolation that the writer would offer to the bereaved family, and that is, that while her earthly career is ended, there is that belief of a reunion in the hereafter. That is the sweetness of life—of knowing that the family circle will be united in the hereafter. Such a feeling is always felt by them who believe in the immortality of the soul. That is a precious and comforting thought. It inspires the heart with hope and causes one to realize that life does not end here.
