TALKS ON THE PANAMA CANAL

Opinion Held that Colombia Does Not Have to be Consulted.

By Union Associated Press. Washington, Nov. 29.—Chairman of committee on foreign relations Cullom has discussed with the President the expediency of beginning work on the Panama canal without obtaining a treaty from Colombia. He is not satisfied that a treaty is absolutely essential, and is inclined to believe that having purchased the property and secured concession now held by the Panama company, work can be prosecuted by the United States without any further formality.

Comet to Pass Near Mercury.
Special to the Record. Boston, Mass., Nov. 29.—Calculations made at the Harvard Observatory show that the comet B. 1902, this evening will pass within 1,044,000,000 miles of Mercury. Effects of the disturbance upon the planet can, therefore, be determined so accurately that a good value of the mass may be obtained. It is expected the comet will be visible after passing its perihelion.

Members present, H. L. Cary, Dr. G. W. Remage and E. F. Walker. Moved and carried that in as much as the Rev. F. L. Cox, pastor of the Baptist church of Jennings, La., has violated the ordinances of the Board of Health and the proclamation of the mayor relative to the quarantine regulations and also from his pulpit openly advised the public to do likewise: be it therefore resolved that the mayor be requested to take such action as may be necessary to enforce section No. 4 of act No. 150.

Moved and carried that the quarantine be declared off as to schools and Sunday schools etc. except in the families where cases of scarlet fever have occurred the children shall remain out of school till further notice from the health authorities. 
