

that all, without distinction of party, would need the aid and sympathy of the foreign born citizens in our midst, should such a direful catastrophe happen, as a dissolution of the Union which is so much feared by the great men to whom we have already alluded. It may be that we shall need them in the hour of danger, to buckle on their armor, and stand by our sides in the defence of our very hearth stones and lives, when fanaticism shall have thrown off all restraint, and attempts to do by force, what it can never do by blind zeal, and insulting epithets. Should the dissolution of the Union ever take place, rest assured that these mad-cap abolitionists would never rest until a collision, sooner or later between the north and the south would take place. Who is so lost to reason, and common sense, as not to feel, and know that every citizen, native, and adopted, would be wanted to stand in the breach and ward off the blows that would be aimed at our destruction. It is an old saying that none are so blind as those who will not see. Is it possible that any great portion of our fellow citizens, Democratic, whig, or know nothing, will long remain in this hopeless predicament, when prudence, reason, danger, to say nothing of our sense of right and justice, towards those who happened to be born in a foreign land, loudly proclaim that it is suicidal on our parts. We should seek to unite the people of the south in a firm resolve to resist together, should resistance ever be required for our preservation and happiness, let the blow come from whatever quarter it may. There is a noble band of democrats in all the northern states, aided by a few old line whigs who are gloriously contending for the preservation of the Union, by battling for our rights, under the Constitution, against the fearful odds, which abolitionism is raising to overwhelm them, and to destroy us, should they ever be able to carry out their designs. Shall the people of the south contemplate this contest, between their friends and their enemies, and take no interest in the decision of the struggle. We will not believe it. The democrats of the south, at least, will not desert their friends at the North. They love the Union too well, and appreciate too highly, the noble efforts made by them, to preserve the Constitution, and secure to us our rights as co-equal members of the same national Union. We know that they have justice, reason, and the Constitution to support them, based upon truth, the facts of history, and the eternal principles of right, to sustain them, in the battle they are waging against abolitionism, free soilism, and Know Nothingism at the North, combined. Do they not deserve our aid and sympathy? Shall that be withheld by us, and shall we charge them as the southern Know Nothings do, as being "free soilers, and Abolitionists themselves." Never! Never! We should cheer their hearts, and aid their noble efforts, by encouraging them on in the good work, and approving their course. We should let them know that we have neither lost confidence in them, nor the power of truth over error, in a fair contest. That we still have hope, and firmly believe that the good people of the north will yet do us justice, notwithstanding the efforts of the abolitionists to prevent them. This the south should feel, and await with calmness the result, but at the same time, good feelings, unity, and friendship among ourselves, should be sought by every one, in order that we may be prepared to act, together, should the union be dissolved, which God in his mercy, forefend. This is the duty of the south.
