NEWS NOTES.

The United Presbyterian ministers of Pittsburg, Pa., have adopted a resolution condemning bly cotts. The Anglo-American cable company proposes to reduce rates after May 3 to 6 cents per word. An Irish harp, several hundred years old and valued at \$10,000, arrived in New York Sunday from Ireland.

Governor Oglesby, of Illinois, has gone to Chicago to personally inform himself regarding the railroad strike there. John M. Conner, feather dealer of New York City, and Schiebel & Ellerding, supplies, made assignments last week.

The Catholic nuns at St. Paul's Island, opposite Montreal, are imprisoned in the attic of their convent by the floods. Captain Thomas Kerr, one of the most noted of Ohio steamboat builders, died in Freedom, Pa., Monday aged 78 years.

The Burlington, Kansas, Republican office and two frame buildings adjoining were destroyed by fire Sunday night week. Loss \$5,000. The Union Pacific and Burlington and Missouri River railroad companies have raised their trans-continental passenger rates.

Lung Foo, the new Chinese ambassador and his suite of thirty people, passed through Omaha Monday en route to Washington. William Furner, aged 7, died in Lynchburg, Va., Monday night of trichinosis. His uncle, who also ate of the raw pork, is in a bad condition.

The trial of the six men charged with putting dynamite on the street car track in St. Louis during the strike last winter began Monday. Fire in San Luis Obispo, Cal., Sunday night destroyed Andrews' hotel, the postoffice and several other large buildings, causing a loss of \$120,000.

The bodies of Mrs. Elyan and another old woman who had disappeared two weeks ago were found in a quarry pool near Lemont, Illinois, Monday. One hundred men employed in A. H. Andrews & Co.'s school furniture factory, Chicago, Ill., struck Saturday for an increase of 15 per cent in wages.

By turning cold water into a red-hot boiler in a distillery at Lebanon, Ky., Monday, James Taylor, a fireman, was killed, and John Wheeler fatally wounded. Mr. John Hamblin, an ex-soldier of the rebellion, a local Democratic leader and a justice of the peace of Mooreville township, near Chillicothe, Mo., died on the 19th.

FARM NOTES.

Corn is most likely to attack horses in the spring, as then are most apt to exist the conditions which produce it—change from dry to green food, usual fatigue, weak condition of digestive organs, getting wet, etc. The remedies suggest themselves—care in feeding, watering and working, and the administration of what medicines are necessary to put the digestive organs in good condition.

In transplanting or getting out raspberry plants, care should always be taken to keep the roots moist. None of the fruit plants suffer as much from drying out as these, hence care should be taken to see that the roots are not allowed to become dry. Because there are plenty of wild blackberries is not a sufficient reason why you should not set out, at least a sufficient number to furnish a supply for your own use.

A market gardener had a very fine cow that was milked week after week by hired men. He observed that the amount of butter he carried to market weighed about a pound more on each alternate week. He watched the man and tried the cow after they had finished milking, but always found that there was no milk left in the teats. He finally asked the Scotch girl who took care of the milk if she could account for the difference.

Cure for felon—Take some salt, roast it on a hot stove until all the chlorine gas is thrown off, or it is all dry as you can make it. Take a teaspoonful of Venice turpentine; mix them well into a poultice and apply to a felon. If you have ten felons at once, make as many poultices. Renew the poultice twice a day. In four or five days your felon will, if not opened before your poultice is first put on, present a hole down to the bone where the pent-up matter was before your poultice brought it out.

Mr. John Hamblin, an ex-soldier of the rebellion, a local Democratic leader and a justice of the peace of Mooreville township, near Chillicothe, Mo., died on the 19th. Three convicts escaped from their guards in Little Rock Ark., Monday. Bloodhounds have been put on their track but they have not yet been captured.

Fred Paul, a California sheep ranchman, found a nest of seven young coyotes, which his shepherd dog Flora has adopted and is rearing successfully. Senator Kenna of West Virginia is an amateur photographer and amuses himself in the summer by tramping over the mountains of his state taking views.

It is President Arthur of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers who has said that "strikes mean assessments and assessments mean death to any labor organization." Chas. W.
