

PRESIDENT HARRISON has nominated Howell E. Jackson judge of the United States circuit court, for the eastern district of Tennessee, to fill the vacancy on the United States supreme bench occasioned by the death of the late Associate Justice Lamar.

It seems to be conceded now that the Hon. William R. Morrison, of Illinois, will not be tendered a place in Mr. Cleveland's cabinet. This has greatly encouraged the friends of ex-Governor Francis, of Missouri.

AN electric light wire, at Louisville, Kentucky, broke and fell to the ground Friday night of last week. Before the accident was discovered a couple of horses, driven to a cab, came in contact with the wire and both were killed, as was also a negro who stepped on the deadly wire.

GENERAL JOHN W. NOBLE, President Harrison's secretary of the interior, is now in St. Louis making arrangements for his return to that city at the expiration of his term of office.

GOVERNOR STONE has been completely overwhelmed for several days by applicants for coal oil inspector, at Springfield. Applications have been so numerous and persistent that the governor has determined to send a commissioner to Springfield to examine into the relative fitness of the aspirants before he makes the appointment.

THE intention of the English government to permanently occupy Egypt has developed a vigorous opposition on the part of other European nations. Protests are pouring in upon the British ministry from all quarters.

WEDNESDAY was an interesting event in the history of our country. On that day the two houses of congress met in joint session and counted the electoral vote for president and vice-president of the United States.
