America Ahead.

Our Yankee locomotive builders have gained a signal victory in the Argentine Republic. The department of engineers of Buenos Ayres, in an official report, affirms the superiority of American over English locomotives and railway cars in point of general efficiency and convenience. Not only are American engines and cars less expensive at the outset, but their durability makes it possible to maintain them at less cost than European rolling stock. This seems to be the universal experience of foreigners who have had the opportunity to make comparisons. We sent one hundred and ninety-three locomotives to Brazil in the past two years, eighty-six to Cuba, thirty-four to Mexico and twenty-three to Chili. Three more have just been sent to Belgium, two to Sweden and six to Japan. The new railway from Jaffa to Jerusalem is equipped with American motive power.

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


