Found At Last.

The drawings for a novel invention were filed a few days since in the patent office. It is nothing less than an automatically returnable umbrella. The invention does not differ essentially in appearance from the ordinary umbrella except that it has a stouter handle. Therein concealed the is working part of the device. It is a compactly arranged phonograph, with a multiplying reverberator, that can be heard a distance of from fifteen to twenty-five feet. In connection with the phonograph is a combination lock, which sets the machine for action. The owner of the umbrella on setting it down, simply switches on the combination and soon as it is picked up the phonograph gets in its work. The remarks can be arranged according to the taste of the man who owns the umbrella and can range from a politely couched request not to disturb the rain protector to a stentorian cry of "stop thief" or "this fellow is stealing another man's umbrella" or any other exclamation of a more forcible nature.

**Hicks' January Weather.**

January opens with storms disappearing in the east, and cold, fair weather following in most parts, changing to warmer in the west about the 3rd, resulting in rain and snow. During the 4th, 5th and 6th warmer weather and storms will advance to the east, followed by rising barometer and cold wave from the west. By the 5th, storms will end toward the Atlantic, leaving it cold and fair behind them. Rising temperature, with rain and snow, will return on about the 10th and 11th, being in transit from west to east for three or four days, followed progressively by cold. About the 15th, warmer, with gathering rain and snow storms in the west. Change to warmer, with reactionary storms in their progressive order about the 21st and 22d, after which cold will return, until renewed storms of rain and snow appear from 27th to 30th. Cold wave ends the month.


