The Horrors of the Dilemma.
Kansas City Times.

The Topeka Capital taxes the for-
bearance of its intelligent readers, if
it has any, by publishing this state-
ment: "The Kansas City Times is
still explaining that the McKinley
tariff was as favorable to the sugar
trust as the new tariff of reform, but
the fact remains that sugar was free
under the McKinley law and it is
subject to duty under the reform
tariff."

The McKinley bill provided for the
payment out of the treasury, from
money obtained by taxing the peo-
ple on clothing and other necessities
of life, two cents a pound for raw su-
gar made from cane, beets or maple
sap, and under this provision \$12,-
000,000 was paid last year. It levied
a duty of four-tenths of a cent a
pound on all sugars above No. 16
Dutch standard, and under this pro-
vision the people paid last year
\$20,000,000, every penny of which
went into the treasury of the sugar
trust. Thus \$32,000,000 were paid
last year in the shape of taxes on su-
gar from which the people got no
advantage and the sugar trust all.

The new law repeals the bounty
and saves the treasury the \$12,000,-
000 which it cost. It puts a tax of
forty per cent. on raw sugar which
the sugar trust has to pay when it
buys its raw material and reduces
the protective duty on sugar above
No. 16 Dutch standard, from half a
cent a pound to one-eighth of a cent
a pound. By this change of meth-
ods the treasury is benefited by sav-
ing \$32,000,000 and gaining \$45,-
000,000, making a total difference
in favor of the people of \$77,000,000
a year, and as there has been and
will be no advance in the price of su-
gar every nickel of this vast sum will
be paid by the sugar trust.

The Topeka Capital betrays evi-
dence of lunacy in making the asser-
tion quoted or else it thinks all its
readers are idiots who can be im-
posed on. It doesn't matter to the
public which horn of the dilemma it
impales itself on.

To Destroy Fleas.

A writer in an exchange says:
Fleas sometimes become a serious
pest in houses and it seems a diffi-
cult matter to get rid of them, by
using pyrethrum they are easily de-
stroyed. It can be procured under
the names of Persian insect powder,
Dalmation insect powder or buhaeh;
the latter is the California product
and is generally to be preferred as it
is more likely to be fresh. The pow-
der is dusted into corners and cracks
where the insects secrete themselves
and a repetition of the dusting for two
or three days should be effective. I
once thoroughly freed a dog from
these pests by sprinkling the powder
through his hair. The fleas very
soon commenced dropping off and
none were found after a single treat-
ment.

Gallatin Democrat.


