

STRANGER THAN FICTION

Wanted Gold Discovery in 1847, Near the
Old Spanish Trail, Northwest
of Santa Fe.

Narrative of Uncle Lucien Stewart, Who
Carried the First United States
Mail from Santa Fe to
Los Angeles.

The following from the Daily New
Mexican, published at Santa Fe,
New Mexico, will be of interest to
some of Chariton county's old-time
citizens, who knew Lucien Stewart
when he was a young man and clerk-
ed for several different Keytesville
merchants among whom was Florey
& Edgar, Salisbury & Applegate,
Sanders & Palliam and Dr. Wm. C.
Hill.

Mr. Stewart came to Keytesville
away back in the 30's and lived here
until 1846, when he left for the Mexi-
can war with Col. Sterling Price as
that distinguished warrior's private
secretary and also one of his body
guards.

Mr. Stewart was one of the charter
members of Warren lodge No. 74, A.
F. & A. M., organized in Keytesville
Feb. 5th, 1845, and was the first
secretary the lodge had, and served
in that capacity until he left for the
Mexican war in 1846:

"Uncle Lucien Stewart, of Chama,
who has been hunting for lost placer
fields for more than forty-eight
years, is resting and recuperating at
St. Vincent sanitarium, in Santa Fe.
His story reads like a romance.

Mr. Stewart is 78 years old, his
mind is active and richly stored with
information and his stalwart body is
uncommonly well preserved consid-
ering his age and the hardships he
has encountered on the frontier. He
came to Santa Fe in the spring of
1846 with the 2d Missouri mounted
dragoons under command of Col.
Price. The following year the regi-
ment was disbanded, and in order
to get his discharge, it became neces-
sary for him either to go back to
Leavenworth, declare his intention
to settle in the country or join the
quartermaster's department. He
chose the latter course and was as-
signed to the duty of carrying the
first United States mail from Santa
Fe to Los Angeles, Cal. On the 1st
of September, 1847, he started with
mail for California with a party of
thirteen Americans, four Mexicans
and two United States officers. The
latter were the famous Kit Carson,
then a lieutenant of dragoons, going
to join his regiment at Los Angeles,
Lieut. Doer, of the navy, who after-
ward died in Mexico.

PASSED UP THE CHAMA.
The party took a northwesterly
course and passed up the Chama
river, aiming to take the old Spanish
trail, but missed it near where Tierra
Amarilla now stands. It was decided,
however, to go on in the same direc-
tion as no doubt was entertained
that the trail would soon be found.
Six days out from Santa Fe the
party camped for dinner on a deep
river flowing swiftly through beau-
tiful meadow lands with high and
precipitous mountains rising abruptly
from the water on the east. This
was northwest of Pagosa and Mr.
Stewart is confident it was on one of
the forks of the Piedra, probably the
east fork, near what is now known as
the John O'Neil stock ranch. He de-
scribes that place almost exactly as
the writer will know.

While the others were at dinner,
Mr. Stewart and an old Mexican
placer miner went up the river a
short distance to guard the stock.
While they were so employed the
Mexican said "there is gold here,"
and began washing the gravel with
and ordinary wooden bowl. Mr.
Stewart gathered leaves of skunk
cabbage, which abound in that
region, and the black sand was
poured on these leaves to dry in the
sun.

After working about two hours the
old Mexican blew off the black sand,
gathered up the particles of gold
with an eagle's quill, said to keep
quiet about it, and the procession
moved on. That night the party
camped on top of the mountain
north in a snow storm and the fol-
lowing noon reached the Rio Grande
river, going down a very steep red
hill to a point much above where
Creede is now located. Thence the
journey was continued to the Un-
compagne river and down to its
mouth, where the Spanish trail was
pointed out by some beaver trap-
pers.

The Spanish trail was followed
from that point without difficulty
and in due time the party reached

Los Angeles, and, after delivering
mail to the proper officers, Mr. Stew-
art and the old Mexican went to the
post office and sold him the gold in
the eagle's quill for \$18 cash.

Mr. Stewart was obliged to wait
until May, 1848, before returning
with mail to Santa Fe. Meanwhile
the old Mexican died. When he got
back to Santa Fe he was immedi-
ately ordered to Fort Leavenworth.

So it happened that he was not
able to organize a party to go in
search of the placer mines until the
spring of 1849. Then an Indian
outbreak occurred and his organi-
zation of sixty men and horses was
broken up and disabled. Since then
Mr. Stewart has made many trips
up the forks of the Piedra to their
source, but has never been able to
locate the exact spot where he found
the gold. He hopes to go there
again this summer, but his advanced
age renders it doubtful whether he
will be able to do so. He has lived
at Chama for years and is univers-
ally respected there as an honest and
truthful man. No one could hear
his simple narrative without believ-
ing it."

ier was not bought.




