


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Riley Hall's Treason.

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One of the most tragic accidents in the history of rail-roading in the county took place Sunday afternoon and two lives were hurled without a moment's warning into eternity. In the little cottage near Bishop branch and close to the C. & A. branch, about a mile west of town, live Wm. E. Keith and family, consisting of a wife and six children. One of the sons was Wm. Keith, 28 years old and feeble minded. Sunday afternoon Mr. John H. Payton and a family of movers, who were camped near Keith's residence, saw the young man standing on the track and then heard the rumbling of an approaching train. The mover's wife screamed, "Go and get him," and just then the young man's sister, Annie, aged 19 years, rushed out of the house and onto the track. Just as she reached her brother her foot caught in her dress and she fell. She raised herself on one hand and caught hold of the young man, but it was too late and the engine struck them. They were thrown upon different sides of the track, Wm. being killed instantly and Annie living about ten minutes. Both of the young man's legs were broken and his head was crushed. Miss Annie was struck in the side and her lower limbs were badly mangled.—Louisiana Press.

TREATMENT OF CROUP.

Always have hive syrup and ipecac in the house if you have little children. The minute you discover croupy symptoms give half a teaspoonful of hive syrup to a child of five, and less or more, according to age. Give without diluting, but give a little water afterwards if you like. Cut a piece of flannel as big as your two hands, and a piece of muslin to go on the outside of it, with strings on the four corners to fasten around the neck and under the arms to hold it on. Spread over the flannel a copious quantity of vaseline, grate over it a half nutmeg and drop on five drops of turpentine. Rub these well into the vaseline, then grease the child's chest with vaseline or goose grease and adjust the greased flannel about even with the tops of the shoulders and well over the lower part of the chest. You will find that the child will grow easier in a very short time. His flush will go down and his flesh will get moist. If the croupy symptoms have grown so strong that the child is coughing and tossing in misery, send for a doctor.
