Sixteen to One or Bust.

The McKinley treasury department, through its bureau of statistics, has just issued a statement containing the following remarkable admission of all, and more than all, bimetallicists have claimed:

"The clever coin in Porto Rico amounts to about 6,000,000 pesos. Their bullion value is about 40 cents, but so limited has been this permanent supply for the needs of the island that their commercial value has been 60 cents, occasionally running as high as 67 cents."

Here then we have from the administration itself the admission that by holding down the supply of "40 cent pesos" in circulation, those who control the supply can take advantage of the strong demand for money to force up "their commercial value" to over 60 cents.

This is an advance of 20 cents on the 40-cent peso—that is of fifty per cent.

This increase in their value is due, as the administration shows, to the fact that the supply is "so limited." In the same way Mr. McKinley is forcing the buying power of a hundred-cent gold dollar to a hundred and fifty cents.
