WHILE it is true that no decent citizen will endorse the recent discourteous treatment of Gov. Roosevelt at Victor, Colo. Our Republican friends, who are making such a loud and prolonged howl about it, should remember that it is no worse than the ruffians of Yale college treated William Jennings Bryan in 1896.

THE secretary of the National Glass company—the glass trust—has admitted to the industrial commission that that the trust is selling flint glass abroad for 15 per cent less than at home, despite the cost of transportation. It is pleasant news that the American consumer pays to supply the foreigner with his glass cheap.

IT seems practically certain that a definite break has taken place between Secretary Hay and President McKinley. The former, although he has been absent from his post for months on a plea of ill health, is known to be perfectly well and strong. The politicians are trying to guess the cause of the break, but so far have not produced a plausible explanation.

THE fact has come to light that Mr. Hanna recently assessed the national banks of Baltimore for \$80,000 on the ground that they were depositors of government funds and should make some return. One bank stood out against the demand and, it is said, the government funds on deposit there will now be at once "required for use" by immaculate Secretary Gage.

GENERAL JOHN B. HENDERSON was in Louisiana last week attending court and when an opportunity presented itself he put in a strong plea for Bryan and his cause. Gen. Henderson first came out against McKinley on imperialism, says the correspondent of the Republic, and now he is against him on the money question. He says McKinley would run on any platform to get to be president, and criticises Roosevelt harshly for saying that this country is now governing the new territory just as Jefferson and Polk governed the territory governed by them. He says that all the territory acquired by those presidents wanted to get into the union, and all of McKinley's territories are fighting to keep out. He declared that not a delegate to the Cuban convention is in favor of annexation, and that the people of Porto Rico hate us. "I have no doubt," he continued, "but that the people of Porto Rico and the Philippines would rather go back to Spain than to be governed by our nation. The discriminating tariff against Porto Rico is an outrage. There is no use for the sound-money people to vote for McKinley. McKinley is not a sound-money president. He has had both houses of congress and has given us no real sound-money legislation. If the people of this country ever get sound money, they will not get it from McKinley, for they have tried him. The gold bill is not a sound-money bill. Gage admits that. They would as well try Mr. Bryan." General Henderson predicts that Mr. Bryan will carry Illinois, Maryland, Kentucky, Indiana and New York.

Democrats Should Wake Up.
There is not the enthusiasm among Missouri Democrats that we would like to know. The interest in the result of the approaching election is not as general nor as widespread nor as deep as the Democracy should manifest. The lukewarmness is noticeable in many sections of Missouri. Democrats have somewhat the advantage of Republicans in this particular for there is even less interest and even more apathy among Republicans than among Democrats. Republicans appear disgusted with the record of their party and, therefore, they are all apathetic. Democrats seem to be over-confident and in consequence they are indifferent and careless about the result of the campaign.

The Missouri Democrats should wake up. It will not do to depend upon the Democratic majorities of the past to win the election this fall. Remember 1894.—Columbia Herald.
