Mrs. Mary Dulaney of Lebanon came very near losing her house by fire one night last week. She awoke and saw a light from the kitchen, where the fire had caught from the fire-place and burned the lath, studding, etc., about the ceiling. Had not a barrel of water been standing near the house would probably have burned.

Mrs. Paul W. Sexton of Fayette was painfully, but not seriously, hurt in a runaway Friday.
