Last Sunday was a dry day in Chillicothe. All the saloons were closed, and the boys had a hard time getting their "mornin's mornin'." The city administration had issued an order to the saloon men to close their places of business on Sunday and the order was generally obeyed.

Thos. Dillard of Chula has brought suit against that city for \$1,000 damages. He claims that on account of his refusal to pay a fine of \$1 and costs he

Freddie, the 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Dumm of Huntsville, died Saturday. The little fellow had been an invalid all his life.

Dr. M. H. Moore of Columbia succeeds Rev. T. H. B. Anderson as pastor of the M. E. church, South, at Moberly. Rev. Anderson was sent to Shelbina.

While crossing the railroad tracks, opposite the Wabash shops in Moberly, Miss Maggie Teigler was struck by a passing train and severely injured.

John Fleming pleaded guilty to the charge of larceny from a dwelling house at the September term of court at Moberly last week and was sentenced to the penitentiary for two years.
