

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

November, 1902, Adjourned Term.

In addition to the proceedings published in the COURIER last week of the November, 1902, adjourned term of county court, the following business was disposed of by that august body:

Ordered that E. W. Herring, treasurer, pay to J. M. DeMoss the sum of \$50 for services in part in case of L. Benecke et al vs. E. B. Welch et al.

It appearing from the certificate of H. B. Richardson, guardian and curator of Mary S. Tiltonson, a person of unsound mind who is now confined in the state hospital for the insane at St. Joseph as a pay patient, no longer has sufficient estate to support herself at said hospital for the insane, it is, therefore, ordered that she be maintained thereat as a charge against Chariton county.

Chariton county, to use of school funds, vs. Chas. Sweeney, et al.

Upon the application of J. C. T. Kubo, one of the securities on the school fund bond of O. A. Hocker for the sum of \$600, said Hocker is ordered to file a new bond to the school funds.

E. W. Herring, county treasurer, is ordered to credit the sum of \$12 to the interest of the county school funds of 55-20, which said sum was paid by Nancy J.
