A Visit to the City of the Dead, Keytesville, Mo.

(Unavoidably crowded out last week.)

DEAR COURIER:

In company with William Redding, a native of Keytesville, but now a citizen of Liberty, Mo., I visited our cemetery Thursday last, and again alone Friday morning, and made a number of notations from the monuments and tombstones, and thinking they may prove as interesting to some, if not many, of your readers as they are to myself, I give them below with the request that you give this article a place in the COURIER if you deem it advisable.

Felix Redding, known as "Old Master," born June 23, 1782; died April 1, 1863, aged 80 yrs., 9 m. and 17 d.

Ann Redding, known as "Granny," born Oct. 30, 1787; died Feb. 19, 1865, aged 78 yrs., 3 m. and 20 d.

Isaac W. Redding, died Jan. 3, 1869, aged 62 yrs., 6 m. and 6 d.

Elizabeth Redding died Jan. 5, 1842, aged 35 yrs. and 8 m.

Dr. David Petticrew, born Aug. 12, 1807; died Feb. 22, 1847, aged 39 yrs., 6 m. and 10 d. He was called "Old Dr. Petticrew."

John J. Ewing, born in 1802; died Sept. 12, 1838, aged 36 yrs.

Tabitha A. P., wife of J. J. Ewing, N. Ewing and A. M. Clarkson, born Aug. 29, 1806; died Dec. 1, 1855, aged 49 yrs. and 3 m.
