A child of Wm. Butler of near Wakenda died Monday morning.

Mrs. America Madison, one of the oldest colored women of Norborne, died at the home of Spencer Madison in Norborne Saturday.

Rev. J. L. Gilbert, a minister of the M. E. church, South, died Friday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. E. Estle, at the Florence Hotel in Carrollton.

Thos. Oats, a young farmer of Eagle township, took his life by shooting himself through the head with a pistol while lying by the side of his wife in bed about 4:30 o'clock Monday morning. Oats was 28 years old and leaves a wife and two children. No reason for his suicide has been made public.

The residence occupied by John Talbott in Macon, and owned by Mrs. A. L. Knight, was badly damaged by fire about 10:30 o'clock Tuesday morning. The fire caught from a burning shed in the yard of Joe Patterson, a neighbor. The house was erected at a cost of \$1,800, but was only insured for \$800. Mr. Talbott's loss on household goods is estimated at \$300, and is partially insured. A portion of the household effects was saved.

Henry Hereford, a negro coal-miner, was before the court at Bevier Saturday on the charge of helping another negro, "Nubbie" George, steal a hog. "Nubbie" pleaded guilty, but Henry was discharged.
