The daughter of Wm. Street of Bogard went to Carrollton Friday and Dr. J. C. Cooper amputated one of her fingers. She had stuck a needle in the nail and it proved very painful. To relieve the pain she wrapped it up and put what she thought was turpentine on it. Instead she saturated the rag with carbolic acid and the result was such that she had to have the finger amputated.

Talt Terry, a prominent Randolph county farmer, residing north of Huntsville, was found dead in a pasture near his home Saturday morning. Mr. Terry left his home Friday evening seemingly in the best of health and when he failed to return Friday night his family became alarmed and a search for him was started. His dead body was found in J. W. Hammett's pasture, four miles north of Huntsville. The cause of his sudden demise is attributed to heart failure. He was a married man about 30 years old and leaves a wife and several children.

Victor Ellis, a young farmer living near Huntsville, had a very narrow and remarkable escape from death Wednesday. Ellis was hauling a load of hay, when the wagon careened and he was thrown to the ground with about half the load. In falling he was caught by a pitchfork, one of the tines piercing his neck on the left side, just missing the jugular vein, and coming out through his left jaw near the ear. The fork was at once removed and the young man conveyed to town. Outside of a little soreness, Ellis experienced no inconvenience from the accident, and is able to be up and around.

F. N. Rose, vice-president of the Sutherland Building & Contracting Co. of St. Louis, has given out the information that all the sub-contracts for the shoe factory at Moberly have been signed up, and the first material placed on the grounds. A. W. Wright, who will be superintendent of building under A. B. Groves, the architect, says the work will be completed in 90 days. The brick will be of Moberly manufacture. Mr. Rose will be in Moberly for some days or until the work is under way. The grounds are now clear of all houses and the work will be pushed with all possible haste.

The city of Linneus has a church in which its present pastor has rendered longer continuous service, perhaps, than has the pastor of any other church in the state. It is the Second Baptist colored church of that city and Rev. Hardin Morton, col., is pastor. Sunday a big basket dinner meeting was held in honor of the 30th anniversary of Rev. Morton's continuous service. The church house was dedicated 40 years ago and Rev. Barton Hillman, col., for the entire 10 years prior to the selection of Rev. Morton, col. There is doubtless not another church in Missouri 40 years old which has never had but one change of pastors during that period. This certainly speaks well for the men who have served that church.
