A Ghastly Find.

From the Mendon Constitution. About 10 days or two weeks ago while Al Hess and Chas. Padgett, who live eight miles east and one mile south of Mendon, were out hunting they found what appeared to be a newly-made grave in the pasture on the farm belonging to Columbus Kelly. They made no further investigation, but mentioned the fact in their homes, and as a result Joe Hess, Al's brother, became curious to know whether or not it was a real grave and decided to make an investigation. Last Sunday afternoon, in company with Jas. Lisman, a neighbor boy, he went to the described place and the two young men dug into the grave. When they had reached a depth of about three feet they were horrified to find the body of a new-born child. The body was wrapped in a cloth and from all appearances had been buried alive.

These are the facts as told by J. P. Hess, father of the two young men mentioned, who came to town early Monday morning to have the mystery solved, if possible. The coroner was notified and arrangements were made to hold an inquest the following morning, Tuesday at 9 o'clock. The coroner came, but found the grave empty. The body had been removed the night before, it is supposed, by the guilty parties who had no doubt heard of the discovery and feared detection. Quite likely the matter will end here, but it is a dirty shame that the perpetrators of such a dastardly crime could not be apprehended and punished to the fullest extent of the law.
