## CARROLL.

The DeWitt Herald started on its 18th volume last week.

Mrs. Mary Richeson died of pneumonia Monday night.

Louella May, infant daughter of J. Young of Norborne, passed back to her maker Friday.

B. M. Marshall of Carrollton died of Bright's disease Monday at the residence of M. Lowrance.

Leota, little daughter of Albert Wheeler of Norborne, died at the home of her parents Saturday evening.

Merritt Singleton, an old time resident of Carroll county, aged 91 years, died Thursday, near Bedford.

Daniel R. Bartlett, 77 years old, died at the home of his son John, near Miles Point, Thursday morning.

Harve Gibbons of Chillicothe was arrested Friday charged with stealing two umbrellas from a porch in that town. He was intoxicated.


A historic building, constructed by the Mormons in 1835, near Mooresville, was burned Monday. The house was owned by F. P. McClellan.
