Another New Suit.

Wm. H. Bell vs. Wabash Railroad Co., damages. The plaintiff states in his petition that he and his wife and 5-year-old daughter boarded a Wabash train at Miami September 4, 1906, for the purpose of coming to Brunswick, and that defendant's agents and servants by putting the train in motion after reaching Brunswick and before giving plaintiff, his wife and daughter sufficient time to alight plaintiff was thrown violently from the steps of the car to the brick platform of the Brunswick depot and struck upon his head, neck and shoulders upon said platform and other hard substances with such force and violence as to render plaintiff unconscious thereafter, and by reason thereof plaintiff avers he was seriously and permanently injured in his head, neck and shoulders; that his eyes, by reason thereof, have become weakened, his neck stiffened, his shoulders and back sore and his hearing and memory impaired; that he has and ever will suffer pain, inconvenience and loss of time by reason thereof, and has, by reason thereof, been put to large expense for doctors and medicines.

Wherefore, and by reasons all of which, plaintiff says he is damaged in the sum of \$5,000 for which, with costs, he prays judgment. Plaintiff also asks judgment for a similar sum as damages on another and further cause of action as a second count in his petition. Chas. E. Finch of Brunswick, and O. G. Williams and E. M. Harber of Trenton are plaintiff's attorneys. The plaintiff is also a resident of Trenton.

Thos. V. Reid vs. the unknown heirs of Edward S. Jaffray, suit to quiet title. B. L. White of Marceline is of counsel for plaintiff.

Two other have also been filed for the May term of circuit court at Keytesville as follows: Otto C. Meyer vs. Jeff Fieker et al, suit to quiet title. Benecke & Benecke of Brunswick represent plaintiff.

These suits have been docketed for the May, 1907, term of circuit court at Keytesville, making a total of 19 new cases that have been filed for that term, 18 of them being civil and one a criminal case.
