CARROLL.

Mrs. A. R. Calvert of Fairview passed away Monday.

"Redback" Adkins of Carrollton was under arrest last week charged with beating his wife.

Forest, son of W. E. Campe, formerly of Carrollton, died in Georgia last week, aged 21 years.

Mrs. Ann Vincent of near Bosworth succumbed to cancer last week. She leaves a large family of children.

Burglars tried to break into Alma Miller's grocery store in Carrollton Saturday, but were unsuccessful.

Hallowe'en sports were carried rather far in DeWitt Thursday night, considerable property being seriously damaged.

Fire broke out in the summer kitchen at Louis Overhult's house in Norborne Monday. The roof was burned off and about \$100 damage was done to the house.

The Jay Bird club of girls of Carrollton gave a hallowe'en party last week and invited the boys—if they could find the place. The young men were all there.

Richard Rillott, 80 years old, died Tuesday at his home, near DeWitt. Deceased was a native of England, coming to America in 1883. He is survived by three children.

Mrs. Joseph E. Lyons, an old resident of Carroll county, having lived nearly all her life in Trotter township, a native of Kentucky, aged 58 years, passed away Friday.

Mrs. Beniah Owens of Carrollton died at a hospital in St. Joseph Wednesday morning. Deceased received a fall two years ago from the effects of which she never recovered.
