CARROLL.

Mrs. Martha Ann Graham, aged 79 years, died at her home, near Quote, Tuesday.

The youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Sebastian of Fairfield township died Wednesday.

Ada Cook, who was sent to the St. Joseph hospital for insane from Carrollton in 1893, died Monday.

Claud Brooks of Carrollton, charged with the murder of Sidney Herndon the night of January 13, has been sentenced to hang.

Mrs. Madison Phillips, aged 87 years, probably the oldest lady in Bosworth, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. N. M. Bailey, Saturday.

The funeral of Alton B. Dale, who died of appendicitis Wednesday of last week, was held at the Providence church, northwest of Norborne, Friday morning.

A. B. Powrie, a Carrollton merchant, had the misfortune to cut one of his eyes very badly with isinglass one day last week. It is hoped he will not lose his sight.

A barn belonging to Charles Winn in Carrollton was destroyed by fire Friday afternoon. He lost a number of farming implements and some feed. The contents was insured for \$100.

B. C. Smith of Carrollton died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Frank Wright in Shelbyville, Ky. Friday. Deceased was 58 years old and had for many years taught school in Carroll county.

The Wabash local Wednesday set fire to the straw covering the strawberry patch of Murray Murphy of Norborne and before it could be extinguished had burned over more than an acre.

Thursday afternoon Dr. Sheldon of Kansas City, assisted by Dr. DeLamater of Stet, removed an egg-shaped tumor, measuring five inches each way, from the hip of Wm. Donaldson of Stet.

Albert Oliver, a citizen of Carrollton, fell into the hands of pick-pockets while on a prospecting tour to Oklahoma last week and was relieved of his wallet. Eighty cents in change was all they left him.

John M. Crouch, aged 63 years, one of the most prominent farmers of Ridge township, died suddenly about 10:30 o'clock Tuesday night while returning from Bosworth where he had been to attend a banquet.

J. W. Franke, formerly a citizen of Carrollton was arrested in Kansas City Tuesday evening charged with forging his wife's name to a note on which Lewis Blakeley of Carrollton was surety. He is now lodged in the Carroll county jail.
