## CARROLL.

Ad Tracy died Wednesday afternoon at his home in Hale.

Mrs. John Richeson died at her home in Hill township Tuesday.

The 3-weeks-old child of Mr. and Mrs. John Appleberry of Coloma was buried Thursday.

The Presbyterian congregation at Carrollton has just completed a handsome church at a cost of \$10,000.

Mrs. Emma Winfrey, wife of M. M. Winfrey of Carrollton, died of consumption and paralysis at the age of 54 years Friday.

Mrs. Eliza Baker, aged 66 years, died of pneumonia at the home of her son-in-law, W. K. Rose of Combs township, Tuesday morning.

Mrs. Belle Baird, a former resident of DeWitt, died at her home in Kansas City Sunday. Her remains were brought back to DeWitt Thursday for interment.

Mrs. Russell of Carrollton had five hams stolen Sunday night. Two of them were found afterwards, near the Burlington tracks, but the others have not been located yet.

J. R. Platt, aged 85 years, died very suddenly Monday morning at the home of his son, B. Platt, near Maple Grove. His remains were taken to Mulberry, Ind., for interment.

The remains of O. A. Ammerman, who died of typhoid pneumonia in Kansas City, arrived in Carrollton Wednesday and were interred in Oak Hill cemetery. Mr. Ammerman was about 34 years of age.

The DeWitt Herald says: The snagboat, Missouri, formerly the C. R. Suter, is on her way up the Missouri river taking snags out of the channel. She will be in the service between Kansas City and the mouth of the river until the close of the season.

A lighted match thrown on the floor in a closet containing clothing in the home of R. Hawkins of Chillicothe Tuesday morning came very near resulting disastrously. The firemen were called out and did good work, thereby saving the house.

An aged lady named Morgan, enroute from Trenton to Cowgill, stopped off at Chillicothe and went to the home of Thomas Gillispie and refused to leave. An officer took her to a hotel where she was kept over night and sent on her way the next morning.

While Mrs. John Sweeney was in a storeroom in the second story of her home in Chillicothe Tuesday morning she stepped on a match and lighted it. She thought she extinguished the blaze before going down, but later discovered smoke issuing from the room. The firemen responded to the alarm and did valiant work, but not until a great deal of damage was done.

Holton Hildrith, a normal student about 18 years of age, accidentally shot and killed him-

self with a revolver Wednesday night while calling on his sweetheart, Miss Edith Krouse. Miss Krouse testified that they were both sitting on a bed and Hildrith pulled a revolver out of his pocket with the remark that he must put it away and reached behind him when the revolver was accidentally discharged, the ball entering the small of his back and lodging in his right kidney.

Ernest Neidholt a boy 12 years old, gained entrance to the Farrington Candy factory in Chillicothe Tuesday night and helped himself to candy and also appropriated \$2 in pennies. After the robbery the boy went to the American hotel and put up for the night, paying for his night's lodging with pennies and doing the same thing again the next night which led to suspicion. The police were notified and after arresting him put him in a "sweat box." He pleaded guilty and also confessed to a number of other crimes.

The Milwaukee depot at Braymer was robbed of \$250 in cash last Thursday night. Friday morning George Doel, the night operator, was found bound and gagged in the office, and reported that two robbers had tied him and then robbed the office. Monday Doel made a complete confession saying that he and a confederate, Charles Michaels, had robbed the office and that Michaels had bound him in the chair after the robbery. Michaels also confessed and the money was recovered from Michael's garden where it was buried. Doel and Michaels are both in jail at Kingston awaiting trial.

## MACON.

Miss Emma Rhodes died Friday at her home in New Cambria.

The Atlanta high school turned out six graduates last week, three girls and three boys.

Al Walker a farmer of near Ten Mile, fell from his horse on his head so hard that it dislocated his thumb.

The high school ball teams of Macon and LaPlata opened the season at the latter place Thursday. The score was 4 to 3 in favor of LaPlata.

The body of Mrs. Amanda E. Carroll of St. Louis was taken to Macon Monday and interred in Oakwood cemetery. Mrs. Carroll had been an old resident of Macon county.

The forty-second session of the Macon district conference was in session at the M. E. church, South, in Macon last week. A feature of the conference was a resolution on temperance and Sabbath observance.

The remains of Miss Ethel Harnett were taken to Macon Saturday from her home in Batesville, Okla., where she died Friday from the effects of burns, which occurred about four weeks previous by her clothes coming in contact with the flames of a gas stove. Her father, the late Dr. Harnett, was one of Macon county's most prominent men.

Bealmer & Son have let the contract for the building of an elevator to the Younglove Construction Co., of Sioux City, Iowa, to be completed about June 1. The elevator will be 20 feet wide, 30 feet long and 50 feet high from floor of basement to cupola. It will contain six bins which will have a capacity of 15,000 bushels and the cost when completed will be about \$8,000.

Sheriff Graves of Macon returned Wednesday from Clinton, Mo., where he arrested Frank Schollet and Mattie Upton on a warrant charging Schollet with abandoning his wife and five children. In Justice Greer's court Wednesday the defendant was fined \$500 and costs and the justice further remarked, "Then I am going to send you to jail for six months if you don't pay your wife \$1,000. You will be in the hands of the sheriff until you settle up." The Upton woman was discharged.

With the installation of the five new alderman elected at the April election in Bevier, Mayor Rowland has announced that owing to 50 per cent of the revenue having been taken away by the adoption of local option, and as a means of retrenchment thereby made necessary, the mayor and aldermen had signed a waiver of their salaries by agreeing to serve the entire year without pay. The office of street commissioner was abolished. The mayor said further retrenchments would be necessary to keep the city government from running into debt. — Macon Times-Democrat.
