It is further provided in the will that at the death of testator's widow the said Mary Sterne shall receive a credit of \$800 on the note decedent holds against her and her husband for the sum of \$831, leaving a balance of \$31 to be paid back to Mr. Weidey's estate. The widow, Johannes Weidey, and the son, Wm. H. Weidey, are named in the will as executors thereof without bond and are so appointed by the court. The will was made September 17, 1909. 
