## CARROLL.

Mrs. Geo. N. Hubbell of near Tina died of paralysis Sunday.

The infant child of Albert Pearson of Carrollton died Monday.

Walter Burkhardt, aged 24 years, of near Carrollton, died of tuberculosis Sunday afternoon.

Miss Nannie, adopted daughter of C. D. Farquhar of near DeWitt, passed away of malarial fever Wednesday.

By a score of 7 to 5 the Norborne and Carrollton football teams decided the game in favor of Carrollton Saturday.

The roof of H. M. Dickerson's house in Tina caught fire Wednesday and but for quick work would have been completely destroyed.

Lightning killed six fine Galloway cattle for W. M. Brown of near Carrollton Wednesday. The animals were not standing near a fence or building of any kind.

Trial of L. Turner, charged with the murder of a negro woman named Nunley at a street fair in Carrollton two years ago, resulted in an acquittal Saturday in circuit court there.

Geo. Theener of Cheery Valley township brought three ears of white corn into Norborne Saturday that weighed almost two pounds each and are more than 12 inches in length.

Mrs. Mary Allen, 61 years old, a native of Kentucky, formerly of Carrollton, died Tuesday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Von Arb of St. Louis. Four children survive her.

A blaze was discovered in a dwelling-house in Carrollton Thursday. Straw had been piled up against it and a match applied. The house belongs to J. W. Snider and was recently vacated by Luther Cary.

A young woman, identified as Miss Esther Ashley of Carrollton, was found on the river bank at St. Louis one day last week after she had drunk carbolic acid. There is no such person known at Carrollton.

It is said a young lady in Carrollton was noticed after reading Monday's Democrat to go over in the park, sit down and proceed to take off her shoes, then her stockings, turn them wrong side out and put them on again. When the young sporting reporter for the Democrat asked her why she did it, she said she had just read the article about Saturday's football game with Norborne and it was such hot stuff she had to turn the hose on herself—Norborne Leader.

Sunday afternoon the automobile of Dr. Kemp of Hale was smashed to pieces and four occupants were more or less hurt. Dr. Kemp and wife, Mrs. Walston and Mrs. Shafter were taking a spin out in the country. When two miles from Hale and while going down a hill the steering apparatus of the machine broke and the auto ran into a deep gulch at the side of the road. All four occupants were thrown out of the machine, alighting several feet in front in a deep gulch. All were more or less hurt, and Mrs. Walston's injuries are quite serious. The auto was a complete wreck.

A man about 40 years old, evidently under the influence of some dope, got off of an east-bound train at Wakenda Friday. He was found Saturday morning in the engine room of German's elevator. The man's face was all bloody from three soap wounds, his arm was broken in two places and his left shoulder fractured. He gave his name

as Nick Riley and was taken to Carrollton where he died Monday. The people of Wakenda insist that he was slugged and robbed. Blood was found near the railroad tracks and the grass there showed evidence of a struggle.
