Socialism. MARCELINE, Mo. Jan. 28, 1910. EDITOR COURIER, Keytesville, Mo.

Thursday evening, January 20, I went over to Marceline and heard the socialist lecture of Lena Marrow Lewis. I got some of the literature she was distributing. According to their talk and writings it is not surprising that both Christ's kingdom and the governments of this world are entirely misunderstood by socialists, and the whole school of agnostic scientists. Socialism, as stated in its platform, is opposed to private ownership of land and the means of production. It says the wage-workers can not be freed from exploitation without conquering the political power and substituting collective for private ownership of the land and means of production used for exploitation.

As well as I can understand them, property used for exploitation is anything by which a man may make gain for himself. If a farmer owns land by which he can accumulate for himself and family, or a factory or a coal mine, out of which property he can gain wealth for himself and family, he is a capitalist, and socialism condemns him and the government which protects him in holding any property as his own by which he can gain wealth.

Socialism is against private ownership and requires community of goods or means of production. If this political platform is truthful it is against any government that protects private ownership of property, and hence no government at all. No government can exist on an earthy nature without money and the sword, two essentials of temporal power. Distribute the ruling power of money and the sword to every citizen of the nation, and there is no ruling class, but every citizen is his own ruler, hence no government at all but anarchy. The fallacy on which socialism is built is the lie that no sin

exists and that man needs no ruling power to punish crime and enforce law and justice. They claim man's heart is pure and only needs to have the obstruction of existing government removed so that natural virtue would have a chance to develop. This is anarchistic philosophy. The fatal error of socialism is the infidelity that ignores both sin and the God of justice which the Bible reveals in man's fallen state, hence the necessity of government and the power of concentrated wealth and the sword to enforce law and order against crime.

The false assumption that man is pure in heart and only needs education and favorable environments without any ruling power to enforce law and the equal distribution of wealth and government force to all men is the fanaticism of agnostic science and anarchistic madness. They teach that Jesus Christ was a socialist reformer. Jesus Christ to Pilate: "My kingdom is not of this world, if my kingdom were of this world then would my servants fight." This squarely cuts off socialism. The devil is the only world's reformer. Jesus says (Matthew 6): "Take no thought for the body." Socialism says take no thought for anything but the body. Such is the infinite contrast between Christ and socialism. No earthly government since Christ's time was ever more tyrannical or corrupt than then existed. Yet Christ taught no anarchistic or revolutionary reform, but, on the contrary, he and his apostles taught loyalty to government, to pay taxes and honor all rulers while they preached the gospel of salvation from sin to rulers and subjects alike. I have no doubt that the exposure of fraud by socialist agitators is mainly truthful, although often exaggerated, for the devil is not such a fool as not to tell the truth when it serves the purpose of more disastrous lies in fermenting revolutions. But suppose it were possible for these socialist agi-

tors to change places peaceably with existing rulers of our and other countries, would we be sure of a reign of righteousness by men who are scoffers at the Bible and its God? Or would it be any better than to exchange one set of sinners for another set of sinners who never have been tried and whose politics is anarchistic and would undermine all existing governments? They claim socialism does not propose the sword, but the peaceful war of ballots. This is a square contradiction. The ballot means the sword or it means nothing. To elect socialists to government power is to give them the sword, for government is no more than a bag of wind without the sword and money power to enforce the laws. It is a contradiction and an absurdity to talk of ballots or a government without the sword and a money power, and socialism must mean either no government or else by the ballot to place the sword and money power in the hands of socialist agitators who will naturally be the administrators of the complex government.

When by socialism it owns all the land, mines, factories and means of production, a hundred times more power than Taft or Wall street now possess will be in the hands of Debs and leaders of socialism if they succeed with the ballot in overthrowing existing government and make themselves of this world's wealth and power. If these zealous revolutionists could get possession of this wealth and power for professed distribution to the poor, could they be trusted any more than the rich rascals now in possession of the same in Wall street or the White house as the agitators claim? 
