## CARROLL.

Niss Nora Hunt, aged 22 years, daughter of Joseph Hunt of near De Witt, died of measles and bronchitis Sunday.

Arthur Wooden, self-confessed slayer of George Smith of near Bogard, waived preliminary trial and is confined in jail at Carrollton.

Chas. Dugan of near Tina brought to that city Wednesday a freak of nature in the shape of a pig with one head and chest and two bodies.

The building occupied by C. A. Doane in Norborne caught fire by burning trash in the street blowing under the floor. The damage was slight.

John Cooney, aged 85 years, of near Wakenda died of paralysis Friday morning. Deceased was a native of Ireland and is survived by five children.

Walter Jackson, arrested at Keytesville Wednesday for stealing a pair of trousers from Roy Thompson at Norborne, was sentenced to jail for 16 days.

Mrs. Smith Bolby of Carrollton fainted Tuesday morning and fell against a stove, laying back the flesh and exposing the skull. She was found lying in a pool of blood.

W. J. Bryant and Wm. Adkins of De Witt, returning from a public sale Monday, were injured in a runaway accident. Adkins was caught under the surry and dragged, his limbs being wrenched thereby. Bryant sustained a broken rib. The other two occupants of the vehicle were unharmed.

Wm. L. Collins, about 48 years old, died very suddenly Sunday at Maitland, Holt county. Deceased was formerly a resident of Norborne. His death was caused by drinking a poisonous compound sold as liquor by a boot-legger at Maitland, that place being under local option law.

The body of Logan Manning, sometimes called Hargrove, was brought to Carrollton from Kansas City Jan. 26, 1909, and buried there. At the time he was said to have died of pneumonia. Manning lived with a man and his wife. Another man ran off with his landlord's wife and the husband then told the police the real cause of Manning's death, which, he claims, was due to carbolic acid taken in whiskey and administered by his wife and another man. The two secured \$70 in money and Manning's watch. The man is under arrest and the woman is being searched for.

## HOWARD.

Frank Rains, son of Robert Rains, a Howard county citizen, fell under a Katy freight train at Sedalia last week and his right arm was crushed off. He is fireman on the M., K. & T.

Everett Dobyns of Glasgow received a severe scalp wound Monday while working at a quarry below that city. The falling of a heavy log cast up a stick that struck Dobyns senseless.

Howard-Payne college at Fayette is to have a new building at a cost of \$30,000 containing a gymnasium, an auditorium, two

large halls for the two literary societies and a number of class rooms.

A large flouring-mill at New Franklin, owned by Miller Bros., burned down Monday night. A large amount of flour, corn and alfalfa was consumed in the fire. The mill was worth \$12,000 and was insured for \$4,500.

Fire broke out in the butcher-shop of G. W. Halley in Armstrong Monday morning. Quite a little damage was done before the blaze was discovered by P. J. Maupin, who was delivering mail. The building was owned by Harvey & Walkup with no insurance on it. Halley had \$550 insurance on his stock of goods.

The Glasgow parties, who signed a bond for the appearance in circuit court at Sedalia of Frank Wright, brother of J. R. Wright of Glasgow, who is charged with assault and attempted robbery, employed a detective to locate Wright when he recently disappeared. He was captured at Council Bluffs, Ia., last week.

Perkins Baskett, a notoriously bad negro of Fayette, in jail for carving on another negro, pleaded to be allowed to go to see his wife who was ill with pneumonia. Saturday night Baskett, with "Buster," a negro trusty, was permitted to go. Bending over the sick woman to tell her good-bye, he pulled out a knife and stabbed her five times across her throat, breast and abdomen. He then made his escape.

## LIVINGSTON

Mrs. Fletcher Upp of Fairview township died Friday.

There will be 26 graduates from the Chillicothe high school this year.

Ernest Hoerath, aged 45 years, of Chillicothe died of pneumonia Saturday night.

Mrs. R. L. Alnutt of Meadville died at St. Mary's hospital in Chillicothe Sunday night.

Two Livingston county girls were sent to the Industrial Home for Girls at Chillicothe last week.

Charles, 18-year-old son of O. C. Dougherty of Chillicothe, died of kidney trouble Sunday night.

Allie Gates, an orphan girl 19 years old, died of appendicitis Friday at the home of Chas. Kidwell of Fairview township.

William McLewrath of Chillicothe, a veteran of the civil war, aged 76 years, a native of Ireland, died of Bright's disease Monday. He was found dead in bed.

Paul Howard, who was arrested and fined for aiding a prisoner in the jail at Chillicothe to escape was paroled from his sentence on good behavior.

The jury in the Philpott murder case, tried at Chillicothe, last week says that his punishment shall be imprisonment for 10 years. The case will be appealed.

Guy Curry, the negro boy who was shot by Jord Williams, col., at Chillicothe about two weeks ago died of his wounds Tuesday. A charge of murder in the first degree was placed against Williams, who is in the county jail.

Wm. H. Philpott, charged with murder in the first degree, is now on trial at Chillicothe. Philpott killed John Shelhorn at Dawn Christmas day after the two had quarrelled over the price of a soup bone. Philpott claims he struck Shelhorn with a knife after Shelhorn had attacked him with a poker. Shelhorn fell on the knife and it pierced his neck is Philpott's testimony. The trial was brought to an abrupt end by the illness of a jury member.

Fire destroyed Hoge Bros. lumber yard at Chillicothe Tuesday afternoon, causing a loss of \$5,000, partially covered by insurance. A kettle of pitch being melted was set on fire by a spark and caught a number of barrels of tar near by. The heat was so intense that the firemen were handicapped in their work. A cable containing 200 telephone wires was melted. The fire was spectacular and threw out a terrible smoke all over that part of the city.

## MACON.

Macon won the baseball game Friday from Kirksville by a score of 6 to 2.

Mrs. Alex Nickell of Nickell-ton died of cancer Wednesday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. M. Thompson of Macon. Burglars entered the residence of Chas. Gieselman in Macon

Friday night and were engaged in their nefarious trade when Mrs. Gieselman awakened and saw them. They escaped before she could alarm the household. The dim light failed to disclose the fact of whether the unwelcome visitors were white or black.

Dr. W. L. Miller and Everett Martin of Kirksville were arrested last week for bringing two Macon county girls, Ida Watson of near Macon and Viola Owens of near Callao, to Kirksville for immoral purposes. Martin pled guilty and was fined \$5 and costs. Miller was fined \$25 and costs and appealed his case. Recently Miller was fined \$1,200 for writing illegal prescriptions.

A cyclone swept through Macon county Monday afternoon, entering from the southwest, leaving in its wake a tangle of telephone and light wires, uprooted and broken trees and wrecked fences, barns and houses. At College Mound the McGee college building was unroofed for the fourth time in its history. The main strength of the storm traveled so high above the ground that it did no really fatal damage. Geo. H. Smith and little daughter; Mrs. P. W. Campbell and small son all, of College Mound, narrowly escaped death from a piece of tin roofing 30 feet square which was blown toward them as they were returning from the college. It struck very near them. W. B. Marquess of Macon, who viewed the cyclone from his porch likened it to two big hay ropes, twisting and untwisting around each other. Macon's worst storm occurred in May, 1883, and turned all the leaves in the forest black as though a heavy frost had fallen on them.
