## CARROLL.

The graduating class at Norborne this year consists of eight members.

The second county commencement was held at Carrollton Saturday. There was a class of 79.

Wm. Smith, a negro, was tried at Carrollton Friday for striking his wife, and was sent to jail for 12 months.

Miss Georgiana Trussell, formerly of Carroll county, is to marry Elvin Carroll of Fairfield, Neb., May 11.

Harvey Vineyard, born in Ohio 48 years ago, formerly of Carroll county, died of blood poisoning at Oxnard, Cal., Monday.

Wm. Hicks Adams, born in Maryland 80 years ago, died at Carrollton Wednesday. His aged wife and five children mourn his death.

A vicious dog belonging to Chas. Standley attacked Reuben Lewis at Carrollton Saturday. The town marshal killed the animal.

Mrs. Jennie McCullum has traded the furniture and fixtures of the Carroll hotel in Carrollton for a house owned by Abram McNow.

Samuel Harvey Sewell of Tina, a native of Ohio, died of lagrippe Monday. Deceased was 63 years old and leaves a widow and seven children.

Mrs. Mary Jane Starnes, aged 89 years, passed away Saturday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. A. Carpenter of Carrollton. Four children survive her.

The office of J. T. Edmonds' lumber yard at Carrollton was entered by a burglar Wednesday night. An unsuccessful attempt was made to force open the cash drawer.

Richard Harris of Carrollton is under arrest at Kansas City, charged with breaking into a Wabash car. Three men were caught in a car and the train crew locked them up, but two escaped.

Mrs. A. T. Brooks of Fairview township died of paralysis Thursday at the home of her son, John. Deceased was a native of Ohio and was aged 85 years.
