STACY:—Permalia A. Payne, the only child of Elbert and Luenda Payne, was born in Polk county, Mo., October 6, 1852, and died at her home, near Keytesville, Wednesday, June 22, 1910, at 9:05 o'clock p. m., aged 57 years, 8 months and 16 days. Her father died in her childhood, and she moved with her mother and other relatives to Macon county, Mo., in 1863 where she professed faith in Christ as her personal savior and united with the Cumberland Presbyterian church of which she has since been a zealous and devoted member, ever letting her light shine so that others might see her good works and be constrained to glorify their Heavenly Father. The subject of this sketch was united in marriage to Judge Jas. L. Stacy of Keytesville March 28, 1888, and made him a devoted wife and helpful companion. Her death was caused by cancer of the breast with which she was stricken about a year ago and had suffered intensely for the past few months, but bore her affliction with that patience and fortitude that is only known to the true Christian. Naturally, she wanted to get well and be restored to her accustomed usefulness and the pleasures of her home but when she realized that her physical ailment was fatal she became reconciled and was ready to go when the Master called. Mrs. Stacy was beloved by all who knew her and by none more than her seven step-child-

en husband and her aged mother. Mrs. Lucinda Ryals, who had lived with her for the past 12 years, are left to mourn her death, and to all of whom the COURIER extends its tenderest sympathies. Prayer and a short service were held at the family home by Rev. U. A. Ransom yesterday afternoon and interment was had in the city cemetery.
