CIRCUIT COURT PROCEEDINGS.

Regular November 1910 Term at Keytesville.

In addition to the proceedings published in the last issue of the COURIER, the judge's docket shows the following entries at the November, 1910 term of circuit court:

CIVIL CASES.

Viola Kruse et al vs. Robert L. Creason et al, partition; plaintiffs' report of sale approved and deed ordered made to purchaser; O. F. Smith allowed fee of \$30 to be taxed as costs; sheriff ordered to pay costs and make distribution; cause continued to await sheriff's report of final distribution.

Wm. O. Foster et al vs. Lee Roy Carter, partition; sheriff files report of sale which is by the court approved and deed is ordered made to the purchaser; O. F. Smith allowed attorney's fee of \$78 to be taxed as costs and W. H. Bradley allowed \$10 fee as guardian ad litem; sheriff ordered to pay costs and make distribution; and cause continued to await sheriff's report of final distribution.

F. H. Beckman et al vs. Philip Neidholt et al, partition; sheriff files report of sale which is by the court approved and deed ordered made to purchaser; Benecke & Benecke allowed attorney's fee of \$25 to be taxed as costs; C. E. Finch allowed fee as guardian ad litem for minor defendants; sheriff ordered to pay costs and make distribution and cause continued to await sheriff's report of final distribution.

Lucinda C. Brown et al vs. John H. Behm et al, partition; sheriff files report of sale which is by the court approved and deed is ordered made to purchaser O. F. Smith allowed attorney's fee of \$100; sheriff ordered to pay costs and make distribution and cause continued to await sheriff's report of final distribution.

Ann Clausen vs. Della Beck-

man et al, suit to set aside will; trial by a jury who on Nov. 24, 1910 under peremptory instructions from the court returned a verdict sustaining the will and costs adjudging accordingly.

Wm. Boley vs. Ely Smithpeter appeal from justice of peace court; transferred to February 1910 term of circuit court at Salisbury as per written stipulation filed.

David G. Evans vs. T. T. Barnes et al, suit to quiet title; tried by court and title decreed, vested and quieted according to prayer of petition, there being no answer from heirs of T. T. Barnes or other defendants; proof of publication filed and plaintiff ordered to pay costs.

Wm. K. Baird vs. Sarah E. Baird, divorce; trial by court,

plaintiff divorced and adjudged to pay costs.

James Culbertson vs. Viranda Culbertson, divorce; trial by court, plaintiff divorced and adjudged to pay costs.

Luther Coy vs. Doffie Coy, divorce; plaintiff's petition dismissed; trial by court, defendant divorced and judgment for \$300 alimony awarded her; defendant to pay costs.

C. Crossan vs. Western Life Indemnity Co., suit on policy; transferred to February, 1910 term of circuit court at Salisbury as per written stipulation filed.

Maggie White vs. Frank White divorce; trial by the court; plaintiff divorced and awarded the care and custody of minor children; judgment for plaintiff for \$700 alimony; plaintiff to pay

costs.

Peter Vitt vs. T. J. Shaughnessy, damages; transferred to February, 1910 term of circuit court at Salisbury as per written stipulation filed.

J. D. Croff vs. Peter Vitt, replevin and damages; trial by jury who on Nov. 25, 1910 return a verdict for defendant.

Hayes Pump & Planter Co., vs. Hickey & Ward, replevin; transferred to February 1910 term of circuit court at Salisbury as per written stipulation filed.

H. E. Elliott et al vs. O. F. Powell et al, suit on contract and damages; cause set aside and ordered returned to May term of court and cause continued.

Pauline Printzler vs. A. J. Printzler, suit for maintenance and support; trial by court; defendant ordered to pay plaintiff \$12 per month.

First National Bank of Iowa City vs. E. W. Herring, suit on note; trial by jury who on Nov. 26, 1910 return a verdict for the defendant.

Wm. Printzler vs. Pauline Printzler, divorce; trial by court and petition dismissed and costs adjudged against plaintiff.

Bertha Cravens vs. Foster Cravens, divorce; cause continued.

Etta Webber vs. Charles Webber, divorce; trial by court; plaintiff divorced and costs adjudged against plaintiff.

W. H. Ward et al vs. J. W. Topping et al, attachment; continued.

Mary Hall et al vs. Charles Schorge et al, suit to ascertain title; leave to file answer awarded petitioner upon making a new petition and cause continued.

R. W. Taylor & Co., vs. Chas. Keyser, suit on contract and leave to file answer in 90 days awarded petitioner; defendant to file answer in 30 days thereafter and cause continued at defendant's cost.

James Knox vs. Robert T. Knox, arbitration; continued.

Continental Insurance Co., vs. Henry Varnold, suit on note; non suit.

Continental Insurance Co., vs. N. B. Welch, suit on note; non suit.

Continental Insurance Co., vs. J. S. Shipp et al, suit on note; continued by agreement at plaintiff's cost.

Wm. Ward vs. Myrtle Ward, divorce; non suit.

Henry Rucker vs. Eugenia Rucker; cause continued.

Atterberry & Light vs. W. D. West et al, motion requiring clerk to enter case on docket for final order; motion to docket case withdrawn and cause to pass from docket.

Drainage district No. 1, a corporation vs. S. B. Shoemaker, drainage tax; filed by the court; judgment for the amount of tax and interest; cost lien enforced and land ordered sold.

CRIMINAL CASES.

State of Mo. vs. Edmund B. Welch, indictment for assault with intent to kill; continued and defendant's bond fixed a \$500 and bond given with John Welch as security.

State of Mo. vs. John Cunningham, murder in 2nd degree; grand jury return into open court and by its foreman, Robt. Donaldson, report not a true bill, Nov. 23, 1910, whereupon the report is ordered filed and defendant discharged.

State of Missouri vs. James Clark' catching fish unlawfully; defendant pleads guilty and is fined \$50 with a stay of execution as to costs.

State of Missouri vs. John Aldridge, appeal from justice of peace court; trial by jury who return a verdict of guilty and assess a fine of \$25 and costs; stay of execution is made during good behavior and defendant to pay costs.
