Bad Wreck on wabash.

Train No. 3 in charge of Conductor Chas. A. Church and Engineer T. J. Williams was run into by the Excelsior Springs branch train which had Conductor Z. K. Smith and Engineer Chris Smith in charge, at Missouri City Monday afternoon. The results were most disastrous. Train No. 3 was stopped and a brake beam was being repaired. The accommodation train which was running as second No. 3 was flagged and torpedoes were placed on the track, but the ice on the rails rendered the track too slippery to stop. The trains crashed together and three persons in the observation car were injured slightly. One of them was Dr. Henry R. Conway of Carrollton who is well-known at this place. Conductor Smith died of his injuries three hours after his accident. Engineer Williams had three fingers and thumb of his right hand cut off. Engineer Smith was badly scalded.

Charles Fagan, better known as Buck, a carpenter of Mexico, was found dead his neck broken, near the Alton tracks Thursday evening. Tom Johnson, a negro is being held for investigation by the coroner's jury. It is thought that Fagan's death was due to an attack rather than being struck by a train as he was not bruised and his position indicated that had been laid there instead of falling.
