
We note a dispatch concerning a European divorce dated from Carmine. There ought to be plenty of local color developed in the proceeding.

Daniel S. Alexander of Ottumwa, Ia., formerly of Middle Fork, Macon county, was found guilty under a statutory charge and the jury assessed him a punishment of two years in prison, a light sentence. The majority of the jury were in favor of the highest penalty, however, that of seven years. The testimony introduced, eliminating its repulsive features, was very strange. It centered about Bertha Alexander, daughter of the prisoner. She is 49 years old and displayed some loyalty to her father, charging the offence to John Purden, her father's hired hand.

Wm. Weaver, a red 60 years, was killed in a shooting and stabbing affray at White's Island, west of Marshall Christmas morning. Weaver and one Hezekiah Smith were drinking and Weaver shot at Smith. Smith then stabbed Weaver, causing his speedy death. Both men are white and have families. The coroner's inquest to inquire into this murder was held Wednesday and it was found that not only Hezekiah Smith, but his wife, Maggie Smith and two sons, Amos and Philip, were responsible for the death of William Weaver. He had been stabbed in the left lung and other parts of the body. Whiskey was not the sole cause of the crime. It was probably the result of an old family feud.
