

ORDER OF PUBLICATION

All unknown persons who may have or claim an interest in the land hereinafter described as the heirs, devisees, donees, alienees, or immediate, mesne or remote, voluntary or involuntary grantees of James Heryford, deceased - Defendants.

The State of Missouri, to all of the above interested persons, Greeting:

You are hereby notified that on this 29th day of November, 1911, the above plaintiff filed with the undersigned Clerk of the Circuit Court of Chariton County, Missouri, in vacation, his petition, verified by the affidavit of O. P. Ray, his attorney, wherein he alleges that he is the owner and holds the legal title to the following described real estate, to-wit:

The northwest fractional quarter of Section seven (7), in Township fifty-three (53), Range seventeen (17); and the east half of the northeast quarter, and the east half of the southeast quarter of Section twelve, (12), in Township fifty-three (53), Range eighteen (18), in Chariton county, Missouri; and further alleges therein that he verily believes that there are persons interested in, or who claim to be interested in, said above described real estate, whose names he cannot insert in the petition, because they are unknown to him; and in which petition plaintiff alleges that the claims, titles or interests of such unknown persons, and how derived, so far as known to plaintiff, are such claim, title or interest in and to said lands, as may have been derived as the heirs, devisees, donees, alienees, or immediate, mesne or remote, voluntary or involuntary grantees of James Heryford, deceased, who formerly owned said lands, and the records do not show that he ever conveyed the fee title to the same, and now long since dead.

Wherefore, it is ordered by the undersigned Clerk, in vacation, that said unknown defendants be notified, by publication, that plaintiff has commenced a suit against them in this court, the object and general nature of which is to have the court ascertain and determine the title, interest and estate of the parties hereto, in the above described lands; and that the court define by its decree, and adjudge, the title, estate and interest of the parties hereto in and to said lands; and that such judgment may divest any and all of the defendants of any claim, title or interest in said lands; that plaintiff's title thereto be perfected by limitation, and the entire title to said lands be vested in plaintiff; and for such other and further orders, in the premises, to which plaintiff may be entitled. And unless you, defendants, appear at this court, to be begun and held at the City of Salisbury, Missouri, on the 5th day of February, 1912, and on the first day thereof, answer or plead to the petition in this cause, the same will be taken as confessed, and judgment rendered accordingly.
