



THE COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Democrats Met at Keytesville Monday and Selected Delegates to Joplin.

(CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK)

The committee on resolutions presented the following for the convention's consideration, and which after being read were unanimously adopted:

"We, the Democrats of Chariton county in convention assembled re-affirm our belief in and pledge our loyalty to the principles of our party.

"We rejoice at the increasing signs of awakening throughout the country and point with pride to the many Democratic victories that have swept over the land in the past four years and rejoice in the awakening of the conscience of the nation which is now aroused to free the government from the grip of those who have made it a business asset of the favor-seeking corporations, and express our belief that as a result of the oncoming election that the government of this nation will once more be administered in all its departments according to the Jefferson maxim of equal rights to all and special privileges to none. And in this connection we hereby pledge the full support of the Democratic party of Chariton county to every Democratic candidate in the general election, national, state and county.

"We heartily commend and endorse the able and efficient man-

ner in which the Democratic state officials have discharged the duties of their several offices.
