Court Cleaned out by Allen Family

Last Thursday, Floyd Allen was being sentenced by the Circuit Judge at Hillsville, Virginia to one year in the penitentiary for taking a prisoner from a deputy sheriff. Two brothers of Allen with about 20 companions from the mountains had entered the back part of the court room with rifles and revolvers. Just as Judge Massie was pronouncing the last word of the sentence on Floyd Allen, a volley of bullets struck him and he fell over on his desk, dead. Prosecuting Attorney Foster was then treated to a few bullets and killed. Sheriff Webb sprang after the prisoner who was getting away, and he too was filled with lead. This volley also landed several balls in the prisoner, and he was fatally wounded. Several jurors were struck by flying bullets, one killed, and spectators were wounded. Immediately the firing crowd left the Court house mounted their ponies and rode to their homes in the hills. A posse was formed after considerable loss of time, and after making its way thru the brush for five miles surrounded the cabin of Sida Allen, concealing itself behind stumps, trees and in hollows and opened fire from all sides, the house being in a small clearing. Allen returned the fire, being well supplied with rifles and revolvers, his wife loading as he emptied the guns at the besiegers. His faithful

Eighteen of the mountaineers composing the attacking party are supposed to be over in the Carolina hills, armed and determined, with detectives, soldiers and sheriffs hunting them. Idaho to Have World's Highest Dam

The highest dam in all the world is to be built by the United States government in Boise Canyon, Idaho. This dam, which will be located about twenty miles above the city of Boise, will be 351 feet high, twenty-five feet wide at the top and 1060 feet long.
This wonderful dam will be thrown across a narrow place in the high canyon and will hold back enough water to irrigate 250,000 acres of desert land. It will take three or four years to construct the masonry. Bed rock has been found at a depth of 90 feet below the surface of the river, and when the dam is completed the structure will occupy an acre of ground.
It is only by storing the flood water in such dry sections of this country that the desert land can be reclaimed and made to grow its share of crops. When this dam is completed the water will be drawn off into feeder canals through gates located near the top of the dam. As the level of the water is lowered gates lower in the dam will be opened, so that the gates will never be operated under an excessive head of water. The water pressure will be enormous but modern hydraulic engineering is capable of handling such a giant task. Even should the Boise River be visited by a great flood it will not destroy this dam. Spillways located at each end of the dam will carry away 40,000 cubic feet of water a second and, if necessary, water can run over the face of the dam itself to a depth of from two to four feet without injuring the structure itself.
But water is of little value unless it can be applied direct to the parched earth and not in every case can it be handled by gravity alone. Certain sections around Boise can be irrigated by a canal system, depending upon the natural flow of the water, but all the higher levels must be fed by an elaborate pumping system. These pumps will be operated by electric motors and the electric current will be obtained from the stored up water.
The dam will be pierced by a penstock which will carry the water under enormous pressure to the water turbines which in turn will drive powerful electric generators. This electrical energy will be transmitted over copper wires to the various pumping
