

**"How Much is it Worth?"**

How much a given assortment of live stock is worth no living man can answer. Yet it is answerable to a certain extent. At any rate the principles which govern live stock values can be defined.

"It is worth what it will bring" is the way a veteran live stock salesman at the National Live Stock Commission Company puts it. "You can't get any more out of stock than it will sell for. What it will sell for depends a whole lot on the market and the salesman. The stock itself must be worth a definite amount—that is, it must have the weight and quality that will bring it into some given class. It must be assorted out—and that alone has a lot to do with what it is worth. A bunch of mixed animals sent in any old way and dumped into the pens for the buyers to size them up unfavorably isn't worth anything at all compared to these same animals sorted out right, put in with other animals of the same class to bring up a good showing, watered, fed, all the cripples, sows, stags, sick ones sorted out and all the better animals of pretty near the same weight together. Then again the value of a consignment depends on the buyers. Not just on what they want to pay that special salesman—wants to buy of him because he generally attracts a good supply and they want to encourage him. The salesman who can keep bringing a good line of stuff onto market as short as this one is a benefit to every body. The buyers naturally want to strengthen the men who are able to get the stuff.
