The Huntsville Times is out for the electric line projected between Moberly and Randolph Springs, by C. H. Dameron. Mr. Dameron is willing to go ahead and complete the line between these places if he is guaranteed the refunding of the amount it costs to get the right of way through the country between the towns and the Springs. He says he will complete the line and have it in operation before he expects a cent of money. It is to be hoped that the project carries. The interurban lines have been valuable additions to common carriers in Illinois and other states where they are in operation many town having excess elsewhere by railways which were never before known there. They have to a great extent taken away traffic of a local character from the railways but have been a good thing for the people. Keytesville's hope is in the securing of a line of this character, and, as the interurbans usually follow as nearly as possible the most direct routes, paralleling where possible the big railway systems, it may get one in time, if proper energy is directed in this channel.

WOLVES PLENTIFUL

Pack of 35 Keep Hobo Tread All Night

A pack of about thirty-five wolves with headquarters in the woods along Salt Fork creek in the Napton neighborhood in Saline county became very bold. A few days ago a hobo, westward bound, was chased by a lone wolf and forced to seek refuge in a tree near Nelson. There he was held captive all night, the wolf departing at daybreak. During the full of the moon recently a party of boys went 'possum hunting, and when the hunt broke up about 11 p. m. the three sons of W. W. Umbarger, aged fifteen, thirteen and eleven years started home on horseback. Hearing the howling of wolves from a distance, the boys began to mimic the animals and a large pack was soon in pursuit of the boys. Badly scared, they whipped up their horse and arrived home with the wolves close behind.

Owing to the scarcity of hounds, farmers had been chasing the wolves with bird dogs, but since wolves began to chase the dogs, wolf hunting has been practically abandoned. It is planned to set a day and have all the farmers to join in a hunt soon.

Fire Heroes.

John Bayne Cocke was one of the real heroes of the fire. State Corn Show

The State Corn Show to be held at the College of Agriculture in Columbia, Missouri January 13-17, 1913, gives promise of being by far the best exhibition of its kind ever held in Missouri. Last year we had an excellent show, even though a backward season cut the crop in some sections. This year, taken as a whole, Missouri is credited with an extra heavy corn crop, and the Missouri Corn Growers' Association has provided a list of premiums that will surely bring out the best we have. Approximately \$3000 in cash and premiums will be given away this year. The best ten ears in the Show will win the \$200 State Board of Agriculture Trophy, with a \$75 premium additional. The best single ear in the State will receive a \$45 premium. Eight hundred dollars in cash and premiums will be awarded boys and young men in Missouri.
