They averaged 15 lbs. each which meant that 7500 lbs. of turkey came to that firm in one single day. That is some turkey.

The turkeys are running heavy at this season and there was an unusually fine lot coming in, Tuesday. They ran big in size and good in flesh. Not many of them ran above 25 lbs. each but that is pretty good size when it comes to buying one. A few of them are sold locally but most of them were taken right over to the killing house and put in condition for shipment to the city markets. This is the season of the greatest inflow of the year and the output from the country seems large this year, as they are being brought in by the wagonloads much as hogs were brought in when the pork crop was better than it is now.

Silage Cheap Feed

Silage is cheaper feed than alfalfa or any other kind of feed raised on the farm. That is the belief of N. H. High, of Coaling, Okla. He says this feed netted him \$30 per acre for his corn and at that the corn was not good quality.
