Teacher Training Course

In Brunswick High School

As previously announced, Brunswick High School has been designated as a teacher training course high school. All arrangements have been made for putting in the course: An additional teacher has been employed, a pedagogical library has been ordered, and a room as being fitted up especially for that purpose.

The purpose of the training course is to prepare teachers for the elementary schools, and hence, is a normal school course of one year in the high school. The course consists of four units of work, a unit being the equivalent of a subject recited five times per week for one year. The four units are:

- (1) Pedagogy, including Elementary Psychology and School Management.
- (2) Methods and observation. The method work will consist of discussions as to the best way to teach the common school branches. Work will be observed in the Grades of the Brunswick Schools and the rural schools. At least thirty such observation lessons must be taken during the course.
- (3) Special Reviews. This will include review courses in all the common school branches. The important essential things in each subject will be stressed, the object being to make certain that the subject has a teaching knowledge of all subjects in the elementary school curriculum.
- (4) Agriculture. This course is a broad study of the farm and farm industries. Much work will be done by experiment and observation in the laboratory and field. The most reliable sources will be studied. Special attention will be given to the teaching of agriculture in the rural schools.

Anyone who has completed two years of high school work may take this course and complete it in two years; anyone who has completed three years of high school work may complete the course in one year. At the completion of the course, a diploma is granted which carries with it a certificate, good for two years in any county in the state. At the end of two years a first grade county certificate is granted, provided the graduate has taught successfully.
