LIVINGSTON

There was a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce at Chillicothe Thursday night of last week to perfect plans for business for this Fall and Winter.

John W. Hill, one of the county highway commissioners appointed under the new law appointing three for each county has resigned his appointment. He gave no reasons for his resignation but it is thought that lack of compensation for duties and expenses incurred may be the cause.

R. E. Andreas of Meadville who shot himself with a rifle died at the hospital at Chillicothe Tuesday of last week and was buried at Wheeling, Wednesday. He made no statement as to the reasons for committing the act.

C. Hammond of Morris, Mo. was taken from a Burlington train last week at Chillicothe, in a crazed condition. He had been affected by the heat but was able to resume his journey later the same day.

The daughter of Jess Cox living in this county was burned to death in a barn last week near Hamilton. The origin of the fire is unknown. The child was three years of age.

A man named Brown, traveling with a hypnotist, was arrested and fined \$40 at Chillicothe for giving beer to minors.

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University Scholarship

The Missouri State Fair Board has arranged to pay all necessary expenses for two young Missouri farmers while attending one term of the Short Course in Agriculture at the University of Missouri.

A \$50 cash scholarship is offered as a prize in a corn and stock judging contest, and a similar prize in a corn judging contest. These contests will be held during the Missouri State Fair at Sedalia, September 27 to October 3. The contests are open to all young men in Missouri who have never attended an agricultural college. On Friday Grover Fenton, of Moberly and Miss Eathie Dougherty, of Higbee, came to Fayette and after securing the necessary papers from Circuit Clerk Kirby, were united in marriage. They will make their home near Moberly. The groom gave his age as twenty-three, and the bride as eighteen.

Richard S. Jackson, a native Howard county man, and until several years ago a resident of Fayette, died Thursday at his home in Raytown, a suburb of Kansas City, of tuberculosis. The remains were brought to Fayette Sunday afternoon and interred in the local cemetery.

Wednesday evening, at 7:30 o'clock, at the Christian parsonage, Rev. E. B. Shively officiating, occurred the marriage of Howard Snell and Miss Mary Lewis Perry, both well known young people of Fayette.

About 95,000 cattle were received at the Kansas City stockyards last week this being 148 head less than the world's record for a week, made at Chicago years ago. MACON

Macon people have finally raised sufficient money to guarantee the old Bles Academy being rehabilitated and made into a home for the osteopathic hospital which is to be installed there by the Kirksville School of Osteopathy. It will be the first institution of its kind in the country.
