TOOTHACHE COSTS \$60

Expensive Pain for Local Man According to Recent Macon County Publication

Edward F. Callihan, the young Callao butcher who was arrested last week on suspicion of having raised a postal money order from \$5 to \$65 and obtained the money thereon from Postmaster D. J. Holman at Keytesville, was released by U. S. Commissioner S. J. Wilson Monday after a hearing had established beyond the question of doubt that young Callihan was in Cameron in the morning and in Callao on the afternoon of the day in question. The postmaster also said he was smaller than the man who had cashed the order.

Callihan brought a large number of witnesses here from Callao and Cameron to establish an alibi and his reputation and they succeeded exceedingly well in both respects.

Postmaster J. W. Ayres of Callao identified the order as one issued to S. B. Mathis, a Callao liveryman, on January 24 for \$5 and made out to the county collector of Randolph county at Huntsville. Mathis mailed the order as soon as it was obtained, the postmaster stated, but on Monday afternoon following it was presented at Keytesville for payment, having been raised to \$65 and the name changed to Charley Callihan.

The changes in the order were very crudely made and ordinarily would have been easily detected but the postmaster was suffering with the toothache, he said, and did not examine it as closely as he would have otherwise.

Government officials announced after the hearing that they would continue the investigation. —Macon Times-Democrat.
