This I shall do only in the event of such a wide and urgent demand for my candidacy that I could not well afford to disregard it.

A little more than thirty-five years of my life have been dedicated conscientiously to the duties of the office I now by your commission hold. During that time wealth to the amount of the aggregate wealth of the County, several times over, has passed through and under the supervision of your Probate Court, practically without loss.

I was originally called to the duties of this office by a numerously signed petition from my fellow-democratic citizens, as a number of the older citizens of the County will remember. I promised the people then to hand back their trust at any time untarnished by self-seeking or corruption of any kind. This I have ever held myself ready to do.

I am now an old man, nearing that invisible realm that awaits us. I am poor, having no stored-up material things to assure me a comfortable conclusion of life. But, I would not fear, if out of office, but that the generous people among whom I have so long lived would in good measure extend to me their patronage, in any business I might be engaged in to the extent, at least, of my ability to give them value received.

Should I be called to serve another term I should not under any circumstances seek to extend such service beyond that period, if then still surviving.
