SPEAKER VS PRESIDENT

Speaker Champ Clark felt called upon to oppose President Wilson in the Canal tolls question and took the floor to make a most remarkable speech Tuesday. That the speech was nothing like what the Speaker had intended to deliver when he first fancied there was a good opening for getting back at Mr. Wilson and Secretary Bryan, is patent from what the papers gathered from current talk in Washington before he saw the hand writing on the wall. The speech made 6 columns in the dailies, 3 1-2 of which was a mixture, 99 parts Clark achievements and 1 part eulogistic glue.

The President believed that this nation could not except our coast wise vessels from charges for the use of the Panama canal and be honest with other nations under the treaty entered into with Great Britain before we could start to build the big ditch. It was not necessary to have a separate treaty with other interested nations, because the treaty made included all. The National Democratic Platform declared for the exemption from tolls of all coastwise vessels, as did the platforms of all other parties. The treaty declared that all nations should be on equality in the matter of fees for the use of the canal and it is evident that not only all the other nations understood that the provision included the United States but that this country so understood it, and it was upon this that President Wilson insisted that we act honestly in spirit as well as under our agreement. Mr. Clark and 51 other democrats in the House, invoked the National Platform pledges against the plain agreement and understanding between this and other nations, and he made many solemn protestations of his fidelity to platforms during all his natural life and thereafter. Of course he intended this to apply only to National Democratic platforms, as there are a few in Washington and a whole state full in Missouri who are acquainted with his respect for State Democratic platforms when his personal aggrandizement is involved.

The vote stood; 220 Democratic congressman for the repeal of the exemption, 52 against; 25 Republicans for the repeal and 92 against; 2 Progressive for the repeal and 17 against. It is inexplicable that two of the most distinguished representatives in Congress from this state should extinguish themselves politically in one short year and in practically the same way, but it appears to be a fixed fact.
