

AGAINST CONSOLIDATION

Rothville Votes Down the School Proposition 97 to 63 at Election

The matter of consolidation of school districts is not entirely an uncontested affair in this county as has been shown in Dalton and also at Rothville in the latter place the measure losing out at an election called to vote on the proposition Monday April 20.

The election or meeting for the purpose of voting on the question of consolidating the districts surrounding Rothville and building a high school at Rothville was brought up in the usual way, the petition properly signed being presented the county superintendent of schools and he, being forced under the statute to call the election.

The project was to have an address at 1 p. m. the day of the election to explain some features of the proposed consolidation and the speaker was to be G. W. Readis, the assistant state superintendent of schools. His address scheduled for 1 p. m. was delayed because of the failure of the electors to arrive until 2 p. m., the time for the election and the explanatory address did not materialize. When the question was placed before the gathering of voters a ballot showed that 97 were against the consolidation and 63 in favor of it.

There were a number of different elements entering into the fight. In the first place the working of the law is not generally understood. Again, the country people, many of them near Rothville fought the proposition because they said the school would be too far from their residences if built at Rothville. The location of the school building seems to be the bone of contention there as it is at Dalton.

Had No License

A rather heart-rending story failed to get into the paper last week. It was of the arrest of two of the estimable young men of Keytesville who were en route to Fulton through Fayette, who were "pinched" at Fayette for failure to have on their machine the 1914 license tag. The boys were Elbert and Dempsey Anderson. The former had bought a Ford machine a few days before and was trying its capacities as a touring car. They got to Fayette and were hauling a friend or two in the car when the constable spotted the lack of license. He considerably waited until the boys got to the garage and then placed them under the ban of the law. The car was put in the garage as the officer would not permit the owners to remove it without the license. Dempsey came to Keytesville to get his license tag and Elbert took the train over to Fulton. They came back the latter part of the week all O. K. but the trip was not what it was intended to be and fell far short of the dreams of the young men. The officer was considerate enough to let the boys go without taxing them a fine.

To Mark Highways

A representative of the Goodrich Tire Co. was in the county last week to make arrangements to mark the routes of the North Missouri State Highway and the Capital Trails Highway with markers, these to be furnished by the company. The same organization is planning to place markers on a trans-continental highway. As soon as the markers are prepared, they will be sent to the highway commissioners of the county for installation.

The show that was here all last week did not draw a big crowd. The show season is about ended and the people have been given the opportunities to spend their money on this class of exhibition.

Spraying Cherry Trees

First spraying: After the leaves have begun to come out but before the blossoms open, using Bordeaux mixture (2 lbs. copper sulphate, 3 lbs. lime and 50 gallons of water) or some form of lime sulphur, either the commercial or self-boiled.

Second spraying: As soon as the calyx tube is off the young fruit, use arsenate of lead paste 2 lbs., Bordeaux mixture 2-3-50, self-boiled lime sulphur 7-7-50 or commercial lime sulphur 1 1-4 gallons with water enough to make up 50 gallons of the solution.

These two sprayings are to control the leaf spot and powdery mildew, and to poison the curculio insect which punctures the fruit.

Self-boiled lime sulphur must be prepared at home, as it does not keep well and hence is not kept for sale. To prepare, slake 8 lbs. of lime in a large tub or vat, and while simmering from its own heat stir in 8 lbs. of fine sulphur. Stop the simmering or boiling at the end of eight or ten minutes by adding cold water. Strain into a barrel and add water to make 50 gallons.

Third spraying: Just after the fruit is off, using Bordeaux mixture 2-3-50, self-boiled lime sulphur 7-7-50 or commercial lime sulphur 1 1-2 gallons to 48 1-2 gallons of water. This is to keep the leaves healthy in order that good strong fruit buds may be formed for the next year's crop.

Powdery mildew is likely to be very bad on young cherry trees, particularly those growing in the nursery row. Such trees should be sprayed three or four times with Bordeaux mixture 2-3-50 or either of the lime sulphurs as mentioned above.


