

THE GOLDEN RULE

A speaker at the chautauqua Friday evening took the stand that the only settlement of the economic conditions that confront us in the industrial world today is the spread of the doctrine of the universal brotherhood of man, in other words, doing unto others as everyone would have them do to him.

This is not a new doctrine. It is an old one but the student of economics, not the student of practical politics, will see that this is the only solution of the question. Fortunes are so centered with the mighty rich today and the poor are so helpless that the question of forcing men to relinquish their property rights seems out of the question. The question of tariff and trust legislation seem to be but a hue and cry for political purposes. The broken trusts immediately wax fatter than ever. If anyone suffers from the lowered tariff it is not the man of millions—he could shut his factory for the rest of his life and live. It is the poor man, the factory-worker who suffers if the rich man desires to put the screws to him. This would not indicate that the principal of a lower tariff is wrong nor that the country could or would not be better off if we were back to the day of unrestricted competition. It only illustrates the fact that there is something deeper than politics in the country's situation and that money has the whiphand.

When we learn to separate economics from practical politics we begin to start at the bottom. It seems that big money sources are so centered in a few hands right now, that not much is left but for the moneyed men to open their plethoric purses and grant a largess to the hoi polloi. If there is a method to distribute wealth or divide the income from labor more equitably there seems to have been no mention made of it along party lines. Using present methods, the ultimate conclusion there is a way to compel money to pay for its own protection and justly wield its power it has not been offered our people.—L.

Suffragette Notes

Professor Earl Barnes, an earnest advocate of woman suffrage says:

"In Idaho as in Colorado, the payment of women political workers seems to have become a rather widespread abuse. Under the conditions of the state, with many new settlers constantly arriving, it has long been thought necessary to employ paid workers to register voters; get them out on election day and influence those who are uncertain. After 1896 women were often hired to do this work and were paid from three to five dollars a day. With their weak sense of party affiliation it is claimed that they will work for the party that pays best. A candidate with plenty of money may hire so many workers that it becomes a system of wholesale bribery. It is universally conceded that this is an abuse, and that many women look on election service as a source of pin money to a degree that is undesirable."

That seems to be putting it mildly!

The Rev. Anna Shaw has felt it necessary to write a letter of apology to the president of the United States for the behavior of the 700 club women who recently visited him on behalf of woman suffrage. These 700 women were advertised as representing the 1,600,000 club women of the United States. Heretofore the public acts of these club women have not been such as to call for public apologies. How do they enjoy the fact that their endorsement of suffrage has led immediately to conduct by their representatives which calls for a public apology?

A suffrage writer stated recently that the corrupt female politicians familiar in suffrage states are not representative of the womanhood of America. Nobody claims that they are. They certainly do not represent the anti-suffragists, who make up by far the largest part of the direct product of woman suffrage, which this same writer is laboring to inflict upon her own state.

Teach In French

A school at Kansas City has been opened by the Catholic Sisters of Notre Dame de Sion. The school takes children as young as three years and also takes older children and prepares them for schools or academies. The Montessori system is used exclusively in teaching the very young and the school work is done entirely in French. It will commence with eight instructors all of whom have been here from France about a year. Beginning at the age of 3 years they find it easy for the children to learn French. For eight years there has been a school like this at Marshall, Mo., this, up to the present time being the only school of the kind in the United States. Forty schools in as many different countries are maintained by the parent organization at Paris.

Good Road Days

Governor Major this week issued the proclamation setting apart Tuesday and Wednesday, August 18 and 19 for road days to be celebrated the same as last year—each able bodied man in the state to come out on those days and give two days of work free to the cause of good roads. He can give more if he insists here on. The movement was inaugurated by the mayor a year ago and good results were had from it. The August dates are selected so that people are better able to spare the time necessary for this work than later on or earlier. Last year a quarter million men worked the roads for two days giving a service worth a million and a half of dollars. The governor expects to grab a spade or pick and do his stunt along with the rest of the citizens. He will work in Cole, Boone or Calloway counties. The days were set early in the week so that those industrious persons who desired to give the state more than two days of service could work the rest of the week if they so desired.
