## COURT ALLOWS BILLS

Nothing Unusual Before the Three County Judges—Several Inquests

The county court held a session this week and there was a big lot of bills to allow. There were quite a few inquests held on account of deaths by violence. The most unique item was the petition of G. S. Colyer of west of Salisbury for the right to set up an electric light poles to his house so he can have electric lights. He lives half a mile or more west of Salisbury but wants the electric service badly enough to set the poles and wires this distance. This is progress sure enough. Maybe it is the first link in the chain to connect Salisbury and Keytesville, electrically.
