### Britain Deceives Belgium.

The American Committee on Enlightenment at Munich, Germany, composed of Frank B. Willard, S. M. Fenn, Jacques Mayer, Frank B. Hermann, Julie A. Lentilhon, all of New York; C. F. Thayer of Massachusetts, J. H. Griswold of Illinois, John B. Bauer of West Virginia, Marion Lindsey of Missouri, Mrs. Charles Cahier of Indiana and Maud Fay and L. C. Benton of California, has issued the following statement:

"The American Committee of Enlightenment in Munich declares itself fully in harmony with the unpartisan public opinion that England is to be made directly responsible for this horrible war and has to bear the entire blame for it. The official documents show clearly and plainly that England did not make her influence felt in any way for the preservation of peace, but, to the contrary, fanned the hostile attitude of Russia and France by promising these powers her active support in case of a declaration of war against Germany. Today there is no intelligent person who still believes that France and Russia would have plunged into this war if England had not assured them of her complete support by land and by sea. In the most important hour in which the fate of European civilization hung in the balance, England sided with the Serbian regicides and with Russian autocracy and barbarism.

"We, furthermore, hold England responsible for the lamentable fate of Belgium and of its unhappy inhabitants, whom she has horribly deceived. The whole world knows that there existed a secret agreement between England, France and Belgium, which permitted France to lead her army through Belgian territory against Germany. There are irrefutable proofs in the possession of the

German Government that before the outbreak of the war France had already taken advantage of this agreement. Everyone is convinced today that if France had violated Belgian neutrality England would not have declared war against her ally.

"We raise the further accusation that England is to blame for the protraction of the war in Belgium and for all the indescribable misery into which the Belgian country and people were thereby plunged. Before as well as after the fall of Liege the German Kaiser offered peace to Belgium as well as indemnity and guaranty of the inviolability of its frontiers if she would make no further opposition to the free passage of the German troops. Under the pressure of England and confident in the aid promised by England, Belgium refused the offer, and, true to her traditions and history, England left the unfortunate country to its fate. England stands before the whole world today as the one that formed the only obstacle to peace. Under her pressure France and Russia must fetch the chestnuts out of the fire for England, although these powers are already beginning to comprehend that all the heavy sacrifices which they are making are wholly useless to them.

"We draw the attention of our Government to the violent excesses of which the English officials are guilty toward Americans who travel on neutral ships from and to America, and we protest most emphatically against the many arrogant violations of neutrality which England exercises on neutral ships in neutral waters.

"The American government cannot unconcernedly and without contradiction accept the intervention of Canada in a European war which has nothing to do with the interests and the territory of the Western Hemisphere. Such a policy might lead to counter measures on the part of the European Powers on the North American Continent, which not only threatens our peace and our safety, but can also endanger the principle of the Monroe Doctrine.

"Finally, we call upon our American fellow citizens for a protest against the participation of the Japanese in this European war, brought about by England, for not only our American interests are thereby threatened, but it will also jeopardize the supremacy of the white race, and we, therefore condemn most decidedly England's outrageous attempt to destroy West European culture and German civilization with the help

### Good Stock Profitable.

In A. H. Hamilton's public sale Tuesday, November 17, demonstrated more forcibly than ever that it pays to raise good stock. The cry has been for the past two or three months that the horse market has gone down and that there was no market for them in many cases. But when one of the greatest arrays of good horses ever brought into the ring at Mr. Hamilton's farm they sold from \$168 to \$234 per head, the fact of raising good horses was again emphasized. Hughes Brothers topped the sale on a black 3-year-old mare at \$234. S. B. Mumpower purchased a 5-year old Belgian mare at \$230, and yearling geldings sold as high as \$140 per head. Graded two and three year old heifers sold from \$75 to \$82 per head, and yearlings at \$65. Even at these prices Col. Cies states they were not high when quality is considered.

Robert DeCoursey of Bynumville, a brakeman on the Burlington has sued the road for \$3,000 damages for injuries while at work which he says were due to defective cars and switches, etc. The case comes up to the January term of court.
