Bravery.

The thought of the commander of the British battleship, the Bulwark, standing on the bridge of his ship smoking a cigarette while his ship sank under him will not be approved by Lucy Page Gaston. However it will be admired by most people of all nations. Yet, it is said, that the last war has shown that cowardice is the exception rather than the rule in the conduct of men and women during the present war. A close observer who came from the front, who has seen men die in battle, civilians and even women shot as spies, says that only one case of cowardice, apparently, that of an old Belgians burgomaster about 65 years of age, developed under his observation. All the rest were careless of their fate. Some one has suggested that the man who stays at home and works hard for \$9 a week and takes it all home to his family, is a hero who is deserving of the iron cross. He gets the cross, it is born on his shoulders, not worn on his breast. Bravery is an unknown quality. A sneak may develop temerity which some will think bravery. The bravest soul may be taking the cold steel under his coat lapel and uttering no cry. Ignorance, courage, gallantry, recklessness and bravery may be interchangeable terms. The ostensible coward may win the Victoria Cross under stress of excitement. After, all about the bravest man is he who does his duty the best he knows how, is fair and honorable to his fellow man even when it means some thing to him to lose and uses his conscience as his monitor regardless of how others may look at his conduct.

M. U. College Appropriation.

Experts have picked the College of Agriculture of the University of Missouri as second in rank of the agricultural colleges of the country, Wisconsin alone ranking higher. Yet figures compiled from appropriations made of the colleges, exclusive of agriculture buildings, show that Missouri receives the smallest amount from the state of any of the following colleges:

Missouri (1913-14) \$103,000.
Ames (1914-15) \$399,00.
Wisconsin (1912-13) \$255,072.
Illinois (1913-14) \$426,240.
Kansas (1914-15) 192,880
Nebraska (1914-15) \$190,000
Ohio (1914-15) \$377,399.
Minnesota (1913-14) \$410,249.

For every dollar appropriated by the state legislature, the College of Agriculture of the University of Missouri receives a dollar from the Department of Agriculture of the United States Government. The total appropriation shown includes the amounts given for the teaching force, experiment station and extension work.

State Secretary's Showing.

The receipts of office of Secretary of State under the administration of Cornelius Roach the past year are nearly two hundred thousand dollars in excess of the most prosperous year in the history of the State Department prior to Mr Roach's incumbency. The total receipts for 1914 of his office were \$435,587.62. The receipts during the last four years reach a total of \$1,330,997.09. The last four years of his predecessor's term showed total receipts of 751,118.49, or an average of \$187,779.62 per year. The average during Mr. Roach's term is \$314,404.92. The total revenues as shown by books testify in terms stronger than any language can, of the manner in which the affairs of the office of Secretary of State have been conducted during that period.

Taft For State.

Opposed to national prohibition thinks it perilous.

National prohibition is a dangerous proposition, said former President Wm. H. Taft, speaking before the Bar Association of Boston at its seventeenth triennial banquet. "It would revolutionize the national government," he said "It would put on the shoulders of the Government the duty of sweeping the doorsteps of every home in the land. If national prohibition legislation is passed local government you destroy. And if you destroy local government you destroy one of the things which go to make up a healthy condition of the national government. "National prohibition is nonenforceable; it is a confession on the part of the State governments of inability to control and regulate their own special business and duty. If the matter were placed under Federal control it would result in creation of a machinery of Government officials large enough to nominate any President and would offer too great an opportunity to persons seeking to perpetuate their power in Washington.
