NEVER WAS FOR RUCKER.

The versatile editor of the Moberly Monitor is devoting considerable space to Hon. W. W. Rucker lately, evidently for the purpose of laying the foundation for opposition to that distinguished gentleman in 1916. The only vulnerable point in our congressman's record which the Monitor appears to discern is the vote Judge Rucker cast on the suffrage for women amendment. This, according to the Monitor, constitutes a complete breach of trust and renders the member from the second district anything but a representative of his constituents.

We are as much opposed to Women suffrage as one in public life can afford to be and not be positively obnoxious, and we expect to hold to that course so long as we are not convinced that a majority of the representative women of the state desire the right to vote. We feel perfectly confident that Judge Rucker, personally, is imbued with the same disposition, tho we do not speak with any authority nor venture the opinion on any intimation made to us by the Judge and in case we are correct in our belief, then the Monitor can explain to the satisfaction of the

entire second district the vote cast by Judge Rucker. If we are decidedly wrong, then too the Monitor can account for the vote cast by the Judge just as easily and without the slightest intimation, much less assertion, that Judge Rucker voiced his own sentiment in utter disregard of his constituents.

The Monitor knows of the caucus as well as any other influential paper in Missouri. The Monitor knows what a caucus of the Missouri delegation in Congress means in many instances and no one, not even a member of the delegation, understands the effect of bolting a caucus better than the Monitor. Those congressmen who have done so undoubtedly know better than any one else just what happens to the future usefulness of a bolter. Then why does not the Monitor qualify its allegations and clarify its intentions, even tho the editorial be nothing more or less than the preface to a support of the possible opponent of the Judge at the next democratic primary? The declaration that it did not oppose the Judge at the last election is scarcely sufficient to base friendly criticism on, much less in assuming that from the fact it kept its hands off, it is entitled to and does warn the Judge to make no mistakes whereby he would jeopardize his future public career. Undoubtedly in the same friendly spirit which crops out of the articles bearing on the vote on the suffrage amendment, which, after all the rhetorical pyrotechnics with which the editorials were embellished and before, was nothing more than a resolution before congress by which it would, if adopted, sub
